Traffic calming measures in Chase Way The lead petitioner/residents have been invited to address the forum with a view to taking forward their request. The invite has been accepted. At the meeting, Mr Hope said that traffic calming measures had been introduced in the past and then taken out. Mr Shuttleworth thanked the petitioners for bringing this issue to the forum and said that the Chase Way was not wide enough to accommodate cars passing and has resulted in his personal experience of six smashes into his car and various damage to wing mirrors. He said that there was a secondary and primary school located in the road and that problems were created with the siting of Asda at the end of the road. He called for zero tolerance on speeding vehicles and that there should be a review of not only Chase Way, but of the surrounding roads.

Paul Bragg confirmed that the council had received numerous representations over time from residents with the main concerns being: Non residents such as people who work and visit the local shops and businesses park in these roads all day as these are the only roads that are uncontrolled and are in close proximity to the High Street. Demand for resident parking is high. The roads are always heavily parked on both sides and residents are unable to find a place to park in close proximity to their homes. 		There is no communal heating or hot water in Dollis Valley Way consisting of Garrowsfield, Meadow Way, Rossiterfields, Millbridge, Crocusfield & The Ridge. All of the above have individual domestic low pressure hot water services consisting of a MST and open vented hot water vessel. With regards to concerns about the inadequate size of the boilers, the boilers installed all meet regulation and are serviced annually. If there is a specific address with a problem to do with the boiler, please contact our Gas Maanger, Mamta Malhotra on tel. 020 359 5220 to report the problem. With regards to wall insulation on the Dollis Valley Estate unfortunately Barnet Homes is not able to carry out CWI works as there is no cavity in the building. In addition, we are not able to carry out overcladding works again due to the construction of the building.

However, if no further correspondence was received then that would indicate that the property was not suitable to insulate or it has already been insulated.

It is his view that the current measures were of a substandard nature and would require further repairs sooner rather than later.	Response: Lynn Bishop Due to the national shortage of salt, central government took control of all salt supplies and requested all London Boroughs to restrict gritting operations to a minimal network, known as the Resilience Network. Allocation of salt to the London boroughs was on the basis of the amount required to grit the Resilience Network only and hence the Borough would have run out of salt if ignored the request and continued to grit a wider network. 		Due to the shear volume of pot holes it has been necessary to employ additional resources dedicated to dealing with potholes. In order to ensure that the potholes were made safe as quickly as possible some of the potholes have been filled on a temporary basis. It is likely that those roads with a number of pot holes will need to be resurfaced in the near future and it would not have been a good use of resources to carry out a more expensive permanent repair in those roads.	

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	At the meeting Paul Bragg outlined the road salting programme and how this had changed due to a shortage from 7 January 2010 when London Boroughs were informed that they would not be receiving further supplies and that the salting of priority routes should be cut by 50%. Barnet could not ignore this directive as this would have meant that supplies would have run out. He then outlined how the Council used weather forecasts to shape their activity and he assured Mr Ashwood and other residents that Hadley Green was not given special treatment and that there were records to prove this.	
	The Vice Chairman confirmed her understanding that there was no risk of a resident being sued if they had done everything reasonable to clear the pavement outside their home.	
	Paul Bragg then outlined the reasons and process of the temporary repairs to damaged roads and said that it was not a good use of resources to carry	
	out more permanent repairs as many roads would have to be re-surfaced in the future. He confirmed that as of the day prior to this meeting, more funds had been allocated for road resurfacing, and officers were currently looking at the most damaged roads and those in reserve. He said that any roads identified by residents could be added to the programme.
