1.	Petition Received: Repairs to the front bedroom section of the two front bedroom maisonetts in Warner Close, Marriotts Close and Marsh Drive in order to meet the Government Decent Homes Standards.	The 4 Regeneration Estates, including West Hendon, were outside the Council's ALMO business cost model. Alternative investment was identified for the estates as part of wider regeneration initiatives. However, in September 2007 stock condition surveys were carried out on the four estates to establish the investment needs. A summary of the West Hendon Estate stock condition survey is attached as Appendix 1. Also included are comments as to how the recommendation has or will be dealt with. Please note there has not been a separate health & safety stock condition report.

This strategy is based on a traffic light system in which capital works are prioritised based on health and safety requirements. The programme has been phased over a 3 year period and the budget for the works is £4.36 million.
	Council, Councillor Mike Freer. 156 signatures West Hendon Residents Association	Barnet Homes are now in the second year of the programme and the majority of the capital works to the West Hendon Estate were carried out 2008/9. This included window renewals, upgrading of communal and internal electrical installations and environmental improvements totalling £1.4m. In addition to this, West Hendon received capital funding through the Repairs and Maintenance support programme in 2008/09, with approximately £180k of improvements to elements such as one off kitchen unit replacements and voids works being delivered.
		Barnet Homes also provides a full repairs and maintenance service for the estate.

Appendix 1

West Hendon Externals Roofs

All the blocks apart from the high rise block have pitched roofs. These are in a good condition and no work is required.

The high rise block has a flat roof. There was no access to the roof so it could not be checked as no one had a key. The caretaker advised that the roof had been recovered in recent years.

BH Response:

Very few roof repairs are carried out on the West Hendon estate blocks, however, should these arise they will be dealt with through the repairs and maintenance process.

Windows

The blocks have a mixture of double glazing upvc and s/g timber framed windows with the majority having the s/g timber frames.

These windows are in poor condition and replacement is required. They are starting to cause problems in the flat like condensation and allow some of the heating to escape.

The double glazing windows are relatively modern and no replacement is required.

The costs of the replacement windows are approximately £2750 per flat which is £550 per window.

BH Response:

A window replacement programme has been carried out on the rear elevations of all blocks where the single glazed windows existed, constituting a total of 370 properties contained within the following blocks:

- 1-192 Marsh Drive
- 193-232 Marsh Drive
- 11-98 Marriotts Close
- 11-72 Warner Close

The windows in these blocks have been replaced with double glazed UPVC units. The properties included in this programme consisted of a combination of 2 bedroom maisonettes and 1 bedroom flats. All 1 bedroom flats have had all windows replaced as they are all rear facing, however the 2 bedroom maisonettes still have the original timber framed casement front windows, with new UPVC units to the rear (where living-room and bedroom are).

Rear elevation windows were in a very poor condition as a result of their geographical orientation being south west facing, and therefore subjected to wind driven rain over a long period of time. However, front elevation windows are in significantly better condition, and as a result do not pose a health and safety risk. For this reason and of course the obvious budgetary considerations of managing Regeneration estates, the front elevations were not included in the replacement programme.

Efficiency savings made on the original programme enabled 1 further block with a westerly facing orientation to be included as an addition to the programme. The decision to undertake the works this particular block, was as a result of the windows in this elevation being significantly worse than the front elevation, as a result of it's westerly facing orientation.

Doors

The majority of the doors are in a good condition and minimal replacement is required. The doors are a mixture of upvc and timber.

Some of the blocks are deck access and the doors are open to the elements. These will require cyclical painting to ensure that they are maintained in a good condition and to extend their use.

The cost of replacement doors are upvc £850 & timber £550.

BH Response:

Replacement of doors is undertaken through the repairs and maintenance process when individual need arises.

Structure

The blocks have a variety of finishes which include concrete render, upvc render and brick.

The concrete render is original and in good condition. It only requires cyclical painting. The upvc render is quite modern and generally in a good condition. There are a couple of small areas where it has cracked but replacement is not required.

Pointing in the brickwork is original and in good condition and no work is required.

BH Response:

Cleaning of the external cladding on the elevation where window replacement has been carried out has been done as part of that programme, in line with good value for money practices.

Should the need arise to carryout necessary repair to brickwork, render or cladding, this will be undertaken through the repairs and maintenance process when the need arises.

Communals

The communals are in poor condition. The main entrance doors are quite modern but the locks and several of the call systems have been vandalised and require repairing.

The corridor fire doors are original and in poor condition. The glazing is cracked and cannot be seen through and require maintenance and redecoration.

The lighting in the corridor and stairwells are poor. A lot of it is original. The covers are wither vandalised or discoloured and some of them do not work as not much light is provided in some areas.

Generally an overhaul of everything in the communal areas is required.

BH Response:

Extensive communal and environmental upgrade works have been undertaken on the West Hendon estate as part of the Regeneration Estate Works Programme 2008/9.

The programme includes a variety of work across the entire estate such as:

- Renewal, repair and decoration of communal doors
- Gating off of pram-shed areas and walkways to prevent ASB
- Constructing bin housing and refuse areas
- Redecorating communal entrance areas and stairwells
- Reglazing damaged glass panels and windows
- Carrying out an estate wide pest control programme

In addition to this, a full electrical and lighting upgrade programme to communal areas in the following blocks was undertaken:

- 1-192 Marsh Drive
- 193-232 Marsh Drive
- 11-98 Marriotts Close
- 11-72 Warner Close
- 1-125 Tyrell Way

The approximate total sum spent on the West Hendon estate during the 2008/9 financial year through planned programmes is £1.4m.

NB - this does not include repairs and maintenance spend as well as kitchen/bathroom upgrades and capitalised voids.
