Controlled Parking Zone – Ravenshurst Avenue, London, NW4 Mr Mistry stated that he had been complaining about the free parking bays since 2005 and asked how long it will take to convert the free parking bays to resident parking bays or pay and display bays. Mr P Mistry	In order to ensure that the London Borough of Barnet's Controlled Parking Zones (CPZs) continue to operate effectively, we are currently carrying out a review of 'Free'parking bay provision in the borough with a view to converting them to permit holder parking places or pay and display/cashless parking places as appropriate. Proposal for identified changes will be advertised over the coming weeks and it is anticipated that the majority of approved changes will be introduced by the need of March. Whilst this exercise may not directly affect some roads where there is no free bay provision, the increased capacity in the area as a result of the exercise should mean that the current demand on many residents parking bays is lessened. Our Parking Enforcement Team have also been asked to pay particular attention to the type and size of vehicles that may be parking illegally in the Ravenshurst Avenue area. As the local planning authority, the Council will deal with any application entirely on its planning merits. Saracens are currently running a series of public events regarding their proposals. Julie Oldale (Commercial Services)	Due to a regrettable error made by the distribution company used by the Council, not all properties were delivered letters including those in Bampton Drive, Sandwick Close and Sebergham Grove. Over 4100 letters however were distributed representing the vast majority of the 4500 addresses identified locally for consultation purposes. Park	West Hendon The first phase of 194 new houses and apartments is now on site having secured funding from the government's 'kickstart' programme and the Council's Growth Area Funding. The Council is working closely with its development partners Barratt Metropolitan, to develop a detailed implementation plan for the remaining phases.In total, 889 new units are either completed or under construction across these 3 regeneration projects.Spur Road / Stonegrove A total of 179 new homes have now been completed and occupied at Stonegrove estate. A further 165 new homes are now on site, 62 of which are affordable. These will be completed in 2011. Cool Oak Lane - Construction Lorries I have been reliably informed that one of the conditions attached to outline planning permission was that no lorries would use this road for access to the construction site. There are good reasons for this because this road is a rat run and lorries accessing the site will cause difficulties for drivers trying to drive out of Woolmead Avenue also for pedestrians attempting to cross the road. Geoff Johnson, Woolmead Avenue and Welsh Harp Area Residents Association	The West Hendon Outline approval (W13937/04) does not contain a condition preventing site access via Cool Oak Lane. Condition 11 of the outline approval requires submission of a Construction Management Plan to be approved by the local planning authority prior to any works commencing on site. This must include satisfactory details of construction vehicle routing, as well as access and egress from the site and staff parking arrangements. A Construction Management Plan has been submitted to the planning authority for consideration. This proposes construction vehicle access via Cool Oak Lane and staff parking provision at the former Youth Sailing Base car park Alternative options for construction access off the A5 through the estate have been considered but are not practical due to the width of the estate roads and limited opportunities for turning of construction vehicles. In addition there are also concerns in relation to construction vehicles turning off the A5 at other points and affecting traffic movement. 9.	<ul> <li>Cool Oak Lane – Traffic Calming</li> <li>Since the road has been re-surfaced and the speed tables have been removed by the bridge in Cool Oak</li> <li>Lane, traffic has now speeded up. Cars coming over the bridge towards</li> <li>Edgware Road create a problem for traffic trying to exit Woolmead Avenue and pedestrians attempting to cross the road, an accident waiting to happen. A mini roundabout is needed at the end of</li> <li>Woolmead Avenue as was muted sometime ago. Also the residents have informed me that they want the speed humps replaced by Barnet Council.</li> <li>(ii) Also suggested that "Keep Clear" markings could be introduced as they are effective. Can the timeline for deciding what measures that will be taken be reported to the January Hendon Residents Forum?</li> <li>Geoff Johnson, Woolmead Avenue and Welsh Harp Area Residents Association</li> </ul>	Established practice is to remove speed hump style traffic calming measures when planned carriageway maintenance takes place. Officers are aware that a roundabout has been suggested, but in the first instance, will review the speed surveys that are undertaken prior to and after removal of the tables to determine whether there is a significant increase in speeds that should be addressed. Unfortunately this data was not available at the time of writing. Neil Richardson (Environment and Operations) Neil Richardson (Environment and Operations)	As part of resurfacing programme traffic calming measures such as road humps are removed when roads are resurfaced. To assess the impact of the removal measures the Council carries out speed survey before and after the resurfacing. Speed Surveys for Cool Oak Lane were carried out to the west and east of the bridge. The surveys indicated that 85 <sup>th</sup> percentile speeds approx 150 metres to the west of the bridge have reduced westbound from 39.5 to 30.1 mph and eastbound from 38.1 to 29.5 mph. Approx 75 metres to the east of the bridge (outside no. 55 Cool Oak Lane) speeds have reduced from 25.0 to 23.3 mph westbound and 24.5 to 23.4 mph eastbound. The surveys therefore indicate that speeds have not increased as a result of the removal of the measures. However, in order to confirm these reductions in speeds we will be carrying out further surveys over the next couple of months. <b>Neil Richardson</b> <u>Neil.richardson@barnet.gov.uk</u>
