However, much of the works carried out on the public highway are not instructed by council engineers, but are carried out by the various Utility Companies and their contractors. Some of these works are carried out at very short notice as they are deemed to be emergencies and as such there is not always the opportunity to install advanced warning signs. h)	What s going to happen to the Arts Depot  Andrew Dismore local resident	Amanda Jackson Amanda.jackson@barnet.gov.uk  Following the reduction in funding to local authorities, we now expect to have to make over £40 million savings over the next three years. After protecting critical services such as adult social care and the safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults, we will make as many savings as possible through efficiencies, but there will be real reductions in services. In this context, the Council is proposing to end funding to the Arts Deport Trust on 31 March 2011. This represents about 11% of their annual income.  Recognising the potential for artsdepot to act as a community hub, we are investigating options for delivering Council or other public services from the building. This is with a view to improving the available offer and footfall in the building and contributing to the financial stability of the Arts Depot Trust. In view of the importance of Arts Council funding to artsdepot, we will also do what we can to support the artsdepot's funding application for 2012-2015. Meanwhile, there is a strong, on-going dialogue between the Council and artsdepot, in an effort to find a way forward.  In related budget items, we are also proposing to continue the separately commissioned arts programmes for older and disabled people and for children and young people, albeit on reduced budgets. d)	Ice and Snow The Council own special small 4 wheeled motors for the use on pavements for brushing and anti-week spraying.  Why cant the Council use these vehicles to tow small trucks of slat and grit and spry on icy pavements during inclement weather? The hazards in ice and snow are far greater to pedestrians then to motorist.  May I remind the Council that not all pedestrians are motorist, but all motorists are pedestrians.  Mr Heaphy	The Council currently has 3 footway salt spreading machines for gritting pavements in the Borough. This is considered inadequate and another 22 machines are currently on order to enhance our ability to grit the pavements, particularly in Town Centres.  The suggestion will be investigated further but the concern is that the towing of small trucks on footways will create a bulky, long vehicle which will be problematic in driving on footways. The Council therefore has adopted and operates three different Priorities for the road network, as shown in the table below:    Roads   Footways   Footways   The heavily used footways on steep   Priority 1   Principal Roads, main commuter routes, bus routes and steep   Priority on the s

		Priority 2  Roads in the vicinity of Shopping Centres, Railway Stations, Hospitals, Public Buildings and Schools, Roads with steep gradients.  Roads in the vicinity of Shopping Centres, steep slopes and other vulnerable locations, traffic interchanges, local shopping centres, "vulnerable" buildings (day care centres, doctor's surgeries, libraries etc.), and other residential footways, using all available resources.
		Priority 1 roads and footways are pre-treated with grit when snow, ice or frost may form. Priority 2 and 3 roads and footways are normally post –treated to deal with snowfall or continued icy conditions.  It must be emphasised that in times of accumulated snow, Priority 1 roads will be gritted first and until these routes are found to

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		be safe and running, treatment of Priority 2 roads will not commence.
		Who is liable if you fall?  The Council, as a highway authority under Section 41(1A) of the Highways Act 1980, has a duty "to ensure, so far as is reasonably practicable, that safe passage along a highway is not endangered by snow or ice."
		However, paramount in any wintry conditions is the need to drive and walk within the conditions that prevail (Highway Code Rules 205 and 206) and therefore residents and road users are urged to drive and walk with caution.
