Clive Cohen	The Council's cost for the provision of this year's winter gritting service is currently estimated at £622K. This is based on an average winter for the remaining season. The actual cost for this service last year was £654K.  The provision of the Council's gritting service is regularly reviewed and reported to Council Committees. In July –August 2009, as part of the Council's Overview and Scrutiny arrangements, a Task and Finish Group made up of all party Councillors, was specifically set up to review the Council's winter gritting service. The results of this review were reported to Cabinet.  The lease of the Council's fleet of 9 gritting vehicles is due to expire in November 2011.Officers will be carrying another review of this year's winter gritting service looking in particular at the provision of winter gritting vehicles and the options available for purchasing or leasing gritting vehicles
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3. a)	Queens Road / Brent Street Junction NW4  The roundabout needs to be upgraded and raised. Can signs be installed to encourage smooth follow of traffic?	It is not clear from the question what the actual problem is considered to be, however the operation of the junction will be reviewed in terms of capacity optimisation and safety with appropriate action being taken if necessary.
b)	During the weekend of 8/9 January there was a part closure of the junction of the A406 / Brent Street. This created traffic problems. Can motorist have advanced warnings of road closures?  Sydney Nathan	Whenever, works are instigated by Barnet Highway Engineers the contractor is instructed to install advanced warning signs. However, much of the works carried out on the public highway are not instructed by council engineers, but are carried out by the various Utility Companies and their contractors. Some of these works are carried out at very short notice as they are deemed to be emergencies and as such there is not always the opportunity to install advanced warning signs.  The works referred too were arranged by TfL as it related to the trunk road network. It is normal practice for TfL to arrange for advance warning signs prior to works commencing. We will investigate with colleagues at TfL to find out why this did not occur on this occasion.

4. a)	What is the Council's opinion of the consequences for staying on rates of the cut in Education Maintenance Allowance (EMA)	The Educational Maintenance Allowance, a payment made to 16- 18 year olds to support their participation in education or training is ending for new applicants in England from January 2011. This payment has been means tested for students in post 16 full time education, but awarded without means testing for those in Foundation Learning (also known as E2E) with various training providers. EMA payments are also usually related to the attendance and punctuality of the learner.
		Students who currently receive EMA will continue to receive it for the remainder of this academic year, but not for next.
		It is possible that the cessation of the EMA could result in some disengagement in education and training for 16-18 year olds, with an associated increase in the unemployment rate for young people (NEET). It

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		is also possible that there will be an impact on young people from low income households, without a financial incentive to enter education, or training courses. There could be an increase in drop-out rates from current students on two year programmes.
		Connexions Personal Advisers are available to provide advice and support to students who have the EMA withdrawn, or to new students who may need support to study.
		New <i>Discretionary Support Funds</i> are intended to meet special needs and circumstances of learners aged 16 or over who can't reasonably be covered by other forms of help. Colleges will determine priority groups and maximum amounts they award. The funds are prioritised for those who face financial hardship. They can be used to help with: financial hardship and emergencies; childcare costs (for Ofsted-registered childcare); accommodation costs, for those who have to study further than the maximum distance from home; essential course-related equipment, materials and field trips; travel costs (for over 18s).
		From 2013, all 17 year olds will be required to participate in education or training; from 2015 this will rise to 18 year olds.

	What is the position concerning the outstanding issues form housing benefit. 'from the last forum still not answered'	What assessment has the Council made of the impact of Housing Benefit cuts on local residents' ability to remain in the Borough?
		As previously stated, the Council has carried out modelling of the extent of the reductions in Housing Benefit that are anticipated in Barnet.
		At this stage, it is difficult to assess whether landlords will be prepared to reduce rents to reflect these changes, and the Council has focused efforts on mitigating the potential impact. This includes developing resources to provide advice, support and mediation to tenants and landlords affected by reductions in benefits.
		The government has also announced that transitional protection will be provided to existing claimants, who will not have their benefit adjusted until the anniversary of their claim.
f)	What is happening about the future of the council's allotments?	On 29 <sup>th</sup> November 2010 the Council's Cabinet approved that a new Big Society allotment model could be explored. Council Officers are currently working through this process which includes an initial workshop on the 18 <sup>th</sup> January 2011 to scope out with plot holders what an allotment management

g)	What is happening to the Space day centre, Edgware	Changes at The Space & Community Support Team Briefing for the Learning Disabilities Service
		In keeping with <i>Valuing People</i> and <i>Valuing People Now</i> , Barnet is looking to adopt a more personalized approach in its work with learning disabled service users. This means recognizing that every individual is different and involves offering opportunities which are tailored to the needs and wants of individual users and their families. In addition, these opportunities will enable users to safely make greater use of activities and organizations in their local community.
		The main changes being proposed are as follows:
		<ul> <li>The teams from The Space and the Community Support Team will join together to form a new service from the 1 April 2011.</li> </ul>
		<ul> <li>The service will offer a range of day opportunities, including employment, leisure activities, skills training, education and volunteering.</li> </ul>
		The schedules, activities, groups and transport requirements of service users will be dependent on high-quality individual Person- Centred Plans. These plans will take account of what service users want to do, what they need support with, and what their families need support with. Trained members of staff will hold a meeting with the service user (if appropriate) and their family to complete this plan. We aim to start undertaking these plans in February 2011.

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		The service will make use of a number of community buildings and social hubs. The location of groups and activities will depend on the make-up of the group and the nature of the activity. We expect that the current day centre building used by The Space will be used less as we find a greater range of more suitable and convenient buildings across the borough.
		<ul> <li>The new service will have a manager and senior support workers, who will supervise the combined team of support workers.</li> </ul>
		We do need to make some savings from this change. However, we want to avoid disrupting front-line work with service users as much as possible. Therefore no currently occupied support worker posts will be lost in this new structure. It is proposed that savings come from the deletion of some vacant posts and that there is a reduction in the transport budget, including the loss of a driver.

h)	What s going to happen to the Arts Depot	Following the reduction in funding to local authorities, we now expect to have to make over £40 million savings over the next three years. After protecting critical services such as adult social care and the safeguarding of
	Andrew Dismore local resident	children and vulnerable adults, we will make as many savings as possible through efficiencies, but there will be real reductions in services. In this context, the Council is proposing to end funding to the Arts Deport Trust on 31 March 2011. This represents about 11% of their annual income.
		Recognising the potential for artsdepot to act as a community hub, we are investigating options for delivering Council or other public services from the building. This is with a view to improving the available offer and footfall in

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		the building and contributing to the financial stability of the Arts Depot Trust. In view of the importance of Arts Council funding to artsdepot, we will also do what we can to support the artsdepot's funding application for 2012-2015. Meanwhile, there is a strong, on-going dialogue between the Council and artsdepot, in an effort to find a way forward.
		In related budget items, we are also proposing to continue the separately commissioned arts programmes for older and disabled people and for children and young people, albeit on reduced budgets.

The building is currently used for approximately 50% of the available time, and with the high demand for community space in this location it is hoped that this will continue to provide a valuable asset to the community. Mr Heaphy	The Council currently has 3 footway salt spreading machines for gritting pavements in the Borough. This is considered inadequate and another 22 machines are currently on order to enhance our ability to grit the pavements, particularly in Town Centres.  The suggestion will be investigated further but the concern is that the towing of small trucks on footways will create a bulky, long vehicle which will be problematic in driving on footways. The Council is working closely with its development partners Barratt Metropolitan, to develop a detailed implementation plan for the remaining phases.  In total, 889 new units are either completed or under construction across these 3 regeneration projects. The surveys therefore indicate that speeds have not increased as a result of the removal of the measures.
