5	Petition Received Free Parking Bays in Mill Hill 30 Signatures	The concerns raised in the petition have been carefully considered as part of the decision making process where it has been determined that the free bay conversion in Mill Hill should proceed as originally proposed.  In reaching this decision it was acknowledged that the conversion of free bays would remove the free parking opportunities within CPZs, and therefore would be likely to result in increased costs for those living in, visiting and operating from the CPZ that in the main operates between 11am midday on Mondays to Fridays. Parking in residents bays outside of these times would continue to be free of charge.  In proposing the changes, it was recognised that circumstances vary throughout each CPZ and that in some areas the conversion of free bays may be less beneficial than in others. However, it was considered that in order to introduce a consistent and fair approach in the borough's CPZs that a borough wide view should be adopted to avoid situations where free parking would be available in some CPZs and not others especially as the Council has for some time responded to requests to convert free bays to cater for the growing demands within a CPZ which, if continued would

c)	Church Farm Museum. What is its present level of protection as a listed building? What restrictions does this impose in relation to alterations to the building, inside and outside? What restrictions are there on any development in the Museum's grounds? What rights of way exist through its grounds? What is the estimated cost of a) maintaining and b) securing the property when the museum closes? What steps are the council taking to support any community proposals to take it over? If those plans fall through, what are the council's intentions for the future of the property? What estimate has the council placed on its sale value?	The special character of the building will be a primary consideration in relation to this property, with strong consultation with English Heritage who will have a significant influence on any decision making.  This Listing will apply to the whole building, including the interior, front and back and side elevations and roof. The listing also extends to any object or structure fixed to the building, as well as any freestanding objects or structures which are located within the curtilage of the building and which were erected before 1 July 1948. Curtilage structures can include garden walls, railings, gates and other structures.  Listed building consent is required for demolition or partial demolition, or the alteration or extension of a listed building in a way which will affect its character as a building of special architectural or historic interest. This will be separate from any planning permission for any proposed development.

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		The property is currently subject to Service Review, until the outcome of these decisions become a formal instruction, the future of this property in terms of falling within the asset review work of the Council has therefore not yet been fully formally considered through the Council decision making processes.
		As the property is a listed building it will be exempt from business rates, however there will be a need to use heating and ensure for roof and gutter repairs to protect the historic building fabric. The Council will continue to secure and maintain the site beyond 1 April 2011, as the budget plan for 2011 – 2012 retains funding for building maintenance. The Council has set a three month window to consider community proposals to operate the Museums independently. To support this process, independent advice or guidance can be arranged via the Museums, Libraries and Archives council if requested. At the end of this process, a report will be prepared for the relevant committee – to consider whether a community proposal to operate the Museum is viable.

g)	What assessment has the Council made of the expected pressure on private sector rentals availability as a consequence of people moving to Barnet form inner London, due to changes in their eligibility for Housing benefit? How many extra tenants are expected to move to Barnet?	The full impact of the changes in Barnet and other London Boroughs will not be understood until the changes are fully implemented, as a great deal will depend on the willingness of landlords to reduce rents. Our own landlords have told us that this will depend on a number of factors, particularly the level of income needed to finance their business.  Barnet is one of the less affordable areas, with research suggesting that only 29% of private rented accommodation will be within the new LHA limits, compared to 49% in Haringey and 73% in Enfield, and it is more
		likely that inner London authorities will seek to make use of these more affordable areas.  Discussions are underway with other London boroughs to put in place
		monitoring of inter-borough placements to assess the net effect. At this

h)	What action has the Council taken to acquire private sector rental nominations out of borough for Barnet residents? How many have been acquired? The Council's Housing Service is being realistic about affordability and the supply of private rented sector accommodation, which has to include out of borough provision given the level of Barnet rentals. It is focussing on sourcing private sector accommodation outside of Barnet using additional homelessness grant funding received from CLG.
		During 2010, 36 private sector homes were secured for tenants outside of the borough.

What is the estimate of the number of Barnet residents who will be caught by the new Housing benefit rules requiring those under 35 to share properties?	for single people under 35 be limited to the shared room rate. Under the current scheme, the shared room rate applies to single people under 25. The shared room will not apply to people receiving the middle or high rate of the care component of Disability Living Allowance.  We looked at the case load as at 29.12.2010 and estimate that if the new rule were in effect an additional 979 people between the age of 25 to 34 would be affected. Is it correct that there is a proposal for a new faith school to be established on the site presently occupied by the Garden Centre in Dawes lane, Mill Hill? If so, is it correct that the lease has been transferred to the proposed school; that the school will operate from this Autumn in the buildings presently occupied by amongst others, the Sea Cadets; what land has been or will be transferred to the proposed school; what consideration has been given to the original terms of the transfer of the land to the council in 1924, that it should be for community use; has a planning application been submitted, or informal discussions held with the borough planning officers; is it intended that this should be a so called "free school"; and if so what will be the impact on the budget available to fund other schools in the borough?	A 125 year lease was granted to Country Gardens PLC in 1988. subject to payment of premium and a yearly rent of a peppercorn . The council therefore owns the freehold reversion and in 102 years time the unencumbered freehold may revert to the council (ie.if the lease is not renewed). The lessee is seeking to assign the lease to the free school and terms for the assignment have been negotiated between Wyevale Garden Centre and the free school. The Council are not party to the transaction but are requested to give their consent to the assignment. The school require a change of use under the lease. The council's consent to assignment and change of use under the lease is given on the basis that planning permissions are granted for the change of use and for the school works to be carried out. A planning application will be submitted by the school and will be considered through the normal statutory process. Should planning permission be granted, the school are seeking to take a short term lease of the vacant space in the adjoining Former Civil Defence building while the school refurbishment works are carried out. Terms of the short term lease will be negotiated on the basis of a market rent and reported under delegated powers.
	There will be no transfer of any additional council land to the school although a right of way exists in favour of the school.  The Conveyance made in 1923 to the council's statutory predecessor did not impose any restrictions on the land for community use or otherwise and similarly the land was not acquired subject to any such restrictions, however the provision of a free school in this location is considered to

There are no immediate plans to change this. However, if any changes are to take place in the future they will be dependent on central decision making, taking into account budgets and organisational need.  The principle that SNT's work within their wards remains. However, the Metropolitan Police as an organisation has removed the requirement for SNT officers to be ring fenced. Therefore, SNT officers are allowed to work across ward boundaries when it makes operational sense to do so. For example Hendon SNT officers may work in Colindale ward when issues that are affecting both wards are apparent in order to address the problem in a co-ordinated and productive way. If the unconditional bid is accepted a 5 week period for completion has been recommended, acceptance of the second bid allows a 3 month period to allow for the prospective purchasers to obtain planning permission. The site has been re-marketed off and on a number of times, firstly the original buyer for a school pulled out because of highways issues and the second buyer we found pulled out because of market conditions and because they could not
