1	Cllr Brian Gordon	Could you please give us your brief assessment of the General Election result, and how this will impact on the people of this Borough.	<p><b>Answer by the Leader</b>            The election result was clear and decisive, in Barnet and nationally. It was an endorsement of the work done by the Conservatives in the Coalition and of the plans laid out in the manifesto. Locally, it was a further endorsement of the achievements of our three excellent MPs and the council. It was a dismal night for Labour and a total rejection of their policies. The result will lead to a recovery in the nation's finances and the delivery of essential reform.</p>
2	Cllr Alison Moore	In light of the increasing importance the voluntary and community sector will play in the face of public sector cuts, will the Leader name a councillor Champion to ensure that the sector feels better valued by the council?	<p><b>Answer by the Leader</b>            The Community Leadership Committee was set up to consider issues relating to Barnet's voluntary and community sector. The sector is Championed by Cllr David Longstaff, the Chairman of the Community Leadership Committee.</p>
3	Cllr Brian Gordon	We have been told that Barnet residents can now access details of all parking restrictions in the Borough on a new website called Trafficweb. It will help motorists find out where they can park free, and view yellow line restrictions for each street. Can a similar service be supplied as far as possible by telephone?	<p><b>Cllr Dean Cohen, Chairman of Environment Committee</b>            It is currently possible to access the Trafficweb application with the use of a smart phone. No the technology is only available on the web address <a href="http://www.barnettraffweb.co.uk">www.barnettraffweb.co.uk</a> but it is mobile friendly and can be used on any smart phone.</p>

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4	Cllr Barry Rawlings	Will the Leader welcome the lifting of the threat of closure of the Cricklewood walk-in centre? Given that it is the only site providing a 7 day a week GP surgery, which was a key pledge in the Tory General Election manifesto, is he surprised that the Child's Hill conservative councillors failed to support the campaign earlier this year to save it?	<p><b>Answer by the Leader</b></p> <p>The CCG announced this week that it would not be proceeding with consultation on the closure of the walk in centre service based at the Cricklewood health centre, which also includes a GP practice. The CCG will instead be maintaining the walk in centre while they develop a new urgent care strategy and seek to identify resources to develop extended opening hours in primary care, which they consider will reduce the need for walk in centre provision. NHS England, the commissioner of GPs, has also changed the contract of the GP service based at the same centre to make it easier for them to register new patients. This means that patients may now register with a regular GP at the same location, as opposed to using the walk in centre on an 'as and when' basis.</p>
5	Cllr Brian Gordon	There was recently a report from the Family Rights Group claiming that almost half of siblings in care have been split up. This is an undesirable state of affairs. Have we statistics that show Barnet's record on this subject?	<p><b>Cllr Reuben Thompstone, Chairman of Children, Education, Libraries and Safeguarding Committee</b></p> <p>In response to the question about the statistics for Barnet on siblings in care being split up, the social work assessment of whether it is in the best interests of siblings to be placed together or apart is central. As such, there are three parts to the answer. The data below is for the 2014-15 year and is information submitted as part of Barnet's fostering Ofsted data return 2015;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• 20 sibling groups that were assessed to be placed together were placed together. This is 41 children</li> <li>• 3 sibling groups that were assessed to be placed together were placed apart. This is 7 children</li> <li>• 1 sibling group that was assessed to be placed apart were placed apart. This is 5 children</li> </ul>

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6	Cllr Paul Edwards	Council Rents in Barnet are in the range of £700 per calendar month for 3 bed property, compared to £1500 in the private sector. Many households in Barnet will have to pay an increase of more than 100% in their rent as a result of the recent Budget; does the Leader feel this is fair, just and reasonable?	<p><b>Answer by the Leader</b></p> <p>I do not think the taxpayer should keep some people who do not need help in a subsidised rental when the taxpayer may be worse off.</p>
7	Cllr Brian Gordon	Have we found that an increasing number of motorists have adapted to the cashless method of parking with the use of mobile phones, and is there still a significant demand for the return of a cash machine option?	<p><b>Cllr Dean Cohen, Chairman of Environment Committee</b></p> <p>The statistics for the last quarter shows the following split in regard to payment methods being used:</p> <p>On street transactions:  86.75% Pay by Phone transactions,  10.25% Credit/Debit Card Machines and  3% Other (Paypoint and Scratchcards)</p> <p>Off Street (Car Parks):  56.5% Pay by Phone,  41.5% Credit/Debit Card Machines and  2% Other (Paypoint and Scratchcards)</p> <p>This shows that the number of transactions using the Pay by Phone service is steady and the use of the Credit/Debit Card Machines is increasing. When combined this shows a positive trend of an increased number of transactions and hence more visitors in our Town Centres. The parking service is not receiving many requests for cash machines and when they do, the alternative cash methods of using Paypoint and Scratchcards is promoted.</p>

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8	Cllr Devra Kay	<p>Would the Leader assure me that that he will make every effort to ensure that the problems being experienced by residents now moved into the new-build social housing flats on the West Hendon Estate over the past weeks, such as the failure of the telephone system to work and a similar failure of the emergency pendants for the disabled and vulnerable, as well as the general lack of security which is allowing gangs to break in and run riot in the corridors, will be dealt with as a matter of urgency for the sake of the health and safety of the residents. I turn to the Leader because every other avenue has been explored to no avail.</p>	<p><b>Answer by the Leader</b>  It is important such issues are monitored and help is given to people where it is needed.</p>

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9	Cllr Graham Old	What conclusions did London Councils' Transport and Environment Committee reach about the impact of parking on the high street?	<p><b>Cllr Dean Cohen, Chairman of Environment Committee</b></p> <p>At its meeting on 18th June, London Councils' Transport and Environment Committee Labour Boroughs unanimously backed a collective response to the DCLG's consultation on parking reforms. Within this response it was clearly stated that the impact of parking on the high street has been 'overstated', pointing out that 'shopkeepers consistently overestimate the share of their customers coming by car...by as much as 400%'. It stressed that there is 'no such thing as free parking' as, ultimately, the cost must be borne by the taxpayer. In any case, it concluded that mandatory free parking periods 'would be damaging for high streets'. Instead, it advocated authorities setting prices to achieve 85% occupancy, to maximise access by encouraging turnover. This supports Barnet's current approach. [TEC comprises representatives of each local authority in London and is Labour controlled.]</p>

Qn no	Councillor	Question	Answer
10	Cllr Charlie Omacauley	According to the Met's crime figures as published on their website there has been a sharp increase in crimes of violence against the person in Barnet – 6156 (year to May 2015) compared with 4762 the year before. Would the Leader advise what explanation there is for the increase and what role the council is playing in helping the police reduce violent crime in Barnet?	<p><b>Cllr David Longstaff, Chairman of the Community Leadership Committee</b></p> <p>Barnet Borough Chief Superintendent Adrian Usher has confirmed the following: The increase in recorded violence in Barnet exactly mirrors that of the increase seen across all London Boroughs. All these increases began at exactly the same time in October last year. Experience tells the police that crime does not actually increase or decrease in that way and therefore this was likely to be a process issue. At about the same time last year Her Majesty's Inspector of Constabulary's had released an inspection report into the way the MPS recorded crime and made some recommendations. It is certain that the implementation of these caused differences to the way crime is recorded and thus accounts for the significant majority of the increase if not all of it. This is backed up by the local ambulance service telling the police that they have not seen a rise in calls to violence and the NHS telling the police they have not seen an increase in casualty admissions for violence.</p> <p>For context the borough commander provided an example of the difference in reporting. Prior to October last year if a patrol car was informed by a member of the public that they had just seen people fighting a few hundred yards away and the officers then drive there and didn't find a fight the result given to the control room would have been 'No Trace'. Since the change in the way the police now have been asked to record incidents, they would now record the incident as a crime because a member of the public had said there had been a fight and there was no other evidence to suggest there hadn't been.</p>



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11	Cllr Graham Old	Can the Leader update Council about the progress made on the redevelopment of the Old Barn and the rehousing of the Somali Bravenese community centre there?	<p><b>Answer by the Leader</b></p> <p>The Council has been working with the Somali Bravenese and local community groups to develop the design for a new two storey community centre which will provide shared space and facilities for community groups as well as provide a new home for the Somali Bravenese Welfare Group following an arson attack at Coppetts Road Community Centre in June 2013. The new design will allow much of the existing green space to be retained and further enhanced.</p> <p>Two public exhibitions will take place on 22nd &amp; 25th July as pre-application consultation in order to offer an opportunity for residents to ask questions about the draft plans, as well as provide feedback to help us further develop the design.</p> <p>Once we have gathered feedback detailed design will take place. It is intended that a planning application is submitted in September 2015, with a view to gaining planning permission by the end of the year.</p> <p>This development opportunity represents a significant investment by the Council in providing important new local facilities to serve a wide range of community needs and meet corporate plan objectives.</p> <p>The layout that is currently being developed is for a two storey building, effectively split vertically down the middle, with each side accessible from a shared atrium. The proposal is that one side of the building will be predominantly for the Somali Bravenese, as a replacement for their old facility, and the other half will be for the wider community to use but the building design will allow each side to share each other's facilities easily. The new design will allow much of the existing green space to be retained and there are real opportunities to make that space much better or community use. Ideas are still being developed and it is our intention to seek the input of the local community via two public exhibitions. The first exhibition is to be held at Martin Primary School, Plane Tree Walk, East Finchley, on Wednesday 22nd July between 4pm and 8pm. The second</p>

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			<p>will be held on 25th July from 10am to 12.30pm at the Ann Owens Centre, Oak Lane, East Finchley. Once we have gathered feedback, detailed design will take place and a planning application submitted in September, with a view to gaining planning permission in November. Assuming funding arrangements are finalised concurrently with planning, we then hope to start on site in December 2015 and to complete the building in Autumn 2016.</p>
12	Cllr Anne Hutton	<p>In the light of the fact that there is only one potential provider left standing prepared to bid for the contract to deliver the Education &amp; Skills services, would the Leader admit that the Tory Members on the CELS committee showed at best lack of foresight and at worst incompetency, at the committee meeting on 12 January this year, in voting against my Member's Item to establish a Working Group to develop 'In House' and 'Joint Venture' options, which at the very least, would have given bidders a 'benchmark' against which to develop their offers.</p>	<p><b>Answer by the Leader</b> No. The benchmark in place is in the form of the council's aspirations.</p>
13	Cllr Val Duschinsky	<p>How many new school places have been created in the borough in the last five years and how many more will need to be provided in the next five?</p>	<p><b>Cllr Reuben Thompstone, Chairman of the Children, Education Libraries and Safeguarding Committee</b> Since 2009, 5,500 new primary school places and just under 2,000 new secondary school places have been created through expansions, new schools and new Free Schools. Going forward, it is projected that there will still be a need for new primary provision to meet the demand in growth and regeneration areas (around 270 new reception places) and around 690 new year 7 places (the equivalent of three or four secondary schools) for the additional pupils now in Barnet primary schools. This future need is anticipated to be met again through a mix of expansions to</p>

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			existing primary and secondary schools and new schools.
14	Cllr Kathy Levine	Why is the deadline for objections to the planning application for Abbots depot so close, giving residents less than a month to submit objections during the summer holiday period?	<p><b>Cllr Daniel Thomas, Chairman of the Assets Regeneration and Growth Committee</b></p> <p>The consultation window opened 1<sup>st</sup> July. The Consultation period of 28 days is the standard period of consultation carried out by Barnet Council which exceeds the statutory requirement of 21 days. Notwithstanding this, in the interest of maximising the opportunity for local residents to provide feedback, the council will be extending the consultation window until Aug 20<sup>th</sup>.</p> <p>This means that in total the consultation window will be 43 days, which is double the statutory requirement.</p>
15	Cllr Val Duschinsky	What has been the impact on children and families of the decision by Labour members to refer the ARG committee item related to the opening of a new primary school at Pavilion Way?	<p><b>Cllr Daniel Thomas, Chairman of the Assets Regeneration and Growth Committee</b></p> <p>The children who have applied for a school place at Watling Park Academy do not yet have certainty over the location of where the school will open. The Belle Vue Academy Trust are in regular contact with the families to offer reassurance with the aim of reducing any anxiety among the families about the potential impact on the start of their child's schooling.</p>

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16	Cllr Alan Schneiderman	What assessment has been made of the impact to local cafes and shops facing a hike in the cost of placing tables and chairs or goods on the street outside their business?	<p><b>Cllr Dean Cohen, Chairman of the Environment Committee</b>  The London Borough of Barnet adopted a street trading strategy to extend street trading to licensing table and chairs and shop front displays back in 2008. It utilised temporary licences for this and set a scheme of fees based on the size of the area used to trade.</p> <p>It was found that the existing arrangements for street trading were confusing to traders and inconsistent with the approach used elsewhere and that a review was needed to ensure that the strategy remained fit for purpose.</p> <p>We have noted that the most common feedback we have received from traders about their issues with street trading are:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(1) They would like more space to be able to trade in</li> <li>(2) The 6 months licences are an administrative burden on them</li> <li>(3) They would like to place advertising boards on the pavement</li> </ol> <p>In light of these we have developed a strategy that incorporates all of the above.</p> <p>The proposed policy:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(1) Reduces the minimum free pavement requirement from 2.5 Metres to 2.0 Metres. (Which is more in line with other licensing authorities) allowing for traders to have a larger street trading area.</li> <li>(2) Moves from temporary licences to permanent licences. This allows licences to be granted to up to 3 years, dramatically reducing the burden on businesses. It also confers on the trader more rights in relation to their street trading pitch.</li> <li>(3) Allows for a 6 month trial on licensing advertising boards. These will be allowed in certain areas where they do not cause an obstruction to the public highway. There fee for this has initially been set at £140 per 6 months however if a trader wishes to place one within an already licensed street trading pitch they may, once permission is obtained, do so with no additional fee charged.</li> </ol>

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			<p>We have also reviewed the fees charged for street trading. Currently there are 3 different fee scales for permanent, temporary and street markets and these are broken down into charges based upon the size of the area used. However the licensing process and so costs to deliver are the same for all temporary and permanent applications. The current fees (excluding street markets) range from £200 a year to £2500 a year, despite the same amount of work being put into each application. It is considered that one fee to cover all similar applications is fairer and more appropriate. The efficiency created by reducing from 6 monthly renewal of licences, has resulted in an overall cost reduction in delivering the licensing function, which results in a reduction overall in fees. The proposed fee will mean that the majority of persons who street trade will see a reduction in their fees.</p> <p>We have also reduced the fees charged in relation to street markets.</p>
17	Cllr Val Duschinsky	What is the latest estimate of the cost to the council (and the taxpayer) that will result from delaying the decision on the Pavilion Way site?	<p><b>Cllr Daniel Thomas, Chairman of the Assets Regeneration and Growth Committee</b></p> <p>The cost of providing the temporary accommodation on the Pavilion Way site is being met by central government. To mitigate the impact of the children if it is not possible to provide the temporary accommodation on Pavilion Way site in time for a September opening, the council is working with the Belle Vue Academy Trust on an alternative option which would cost the taxpayer in the region of an additional £30k - £50k.</p>

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18	Cllr Geof Cooke	Labour councillors support the provision of a permanent building for the St Andrew the Apostle Greek Orthodox School as part of the development of North London Business Park N11. Do you agree the government would be letting down the local Greek community if it reneges on its promise to pay the full cost of accommodating the school as it grows?	<p><b>Answer by the Leader</b> I am pleased that the Labour Group supports academies and free schools. This is good news for this school. I hope St Andrew the Apostle School can reach agreement with the owners of the site for an early delivery of the new building and that this very successful school will flourish.</p>
19	Cllr Hugh Rayner	Back garden developments and sleeping in sheds! - the problem is getting significantly worse as residents test and flout the permitted development rights for back garden building. Can you explain what steps are being taken to counter this problem and advise whether enforcement has actually demolished any? In my experience residents simply reduce the height and re-designate as gymnasiums - until they go off enforcement radar!	<p><b>Answer by the Leader</b> During the period 16/07/2014- 15/07/2015 planning enforcement received 83 complaints alleging that a garden building had been converted into a dwelling. This type of development accounted for approximately 5% of all complaints made during this period. It is anticipated that of these 83 allegations approximately 40 will be proven and will require some form of remedial action. In 10-20 of these cases a formal notice will need to be issued. It is rare that the council itself will demolish an unauthorised development but this step was taken in respect of two 'beds in sheds' cases in 2014, and it is hoped that a similar number of such requests will be brought to committee in the very near future. In a number of cases the owner will opt to reduce the height of a building and/or to evict his or her tenants in favour of a gym or similar in order to comply with planning stipulations. Once such steps have been taken it is rare, although not unknown, to receive complaints relating to a recommencement.</p>
20	Cllr Reema Patel	Barnet Council refuses to be involved with the negotiations between care workers and Your Choice Barnet. Can the Council explain why, in light of its 100% management control and ownership of Your Choice Barnet?	<p><b>Answer by the Leader</b> The Barnet Group is an organisation with its own governing board, chairman and chief executive. Councillors from both the Conservative and Labour groups sit on the board of the Barnet Group and attend the meetings of the Your Choice Barnet Board. It is this Board which has made the decision about the terms and conditions of its workforce and it is the responsibility of the Boards of the Barnet Group and Your Choice Barnet to manage this employee relations issue.</p>

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21	Cllr Hugh Rayner	Can the leader please join me in congratulating Bellevue Place Education Trust on taking their first steps in establishing Watling Park School - a new free school on Pavilion Way - bringing an otherwise derelict site into use and providing both a much needed primary school for local children and in due course much needed sports facilities for use by the local community.	<p><b>Answer by the Leader</b> Yes, this is an important and beneficial project that we should all be supporting and driving forward.</p>
22	Cllr Alison Moore	Can the Leader tell me how many Barnet Homes tenants have traded down each year for the past five years, what size their original and trade down properties were, what the average saving in rent was and what financial incentives were given?	<p><b>Cllr Tom Davey, Chairman of Housing Committee</b> In the past 5 years 354 Barnet Homes Tenants have traded down. 10/11 – 79, 11/12 – 70, 12/13 – 50, 13/14 – 92, 14/15 – 63. Of the 354, 131 traded down from a 2 to a 1 bed, 65 from a 3 to a 1 bed, 126 from a 3 to 2 bed, 2 from a 4 to 1 bed, 16 from a 4 to a 2 bed, 10 from a 4 to a 3 bed, 1 from a 5 to a 2 bed, 1 from a 5 to a 4 bed, 1 from a 6 to a 3 bed, 1 from a 6 to a 4 bed. To achieve the 354 trade downs £644,000 has been paid as cash incentives. It is hard to compute individual savings.</p>
23	Cllr Hugh Rayner	Can the Leader comment on the process of rehousing the displaced residents of Sweets Way?	<p><b>Answer by the Leader</b> All bar one of the households from Sweets Way have been moved. 73 in total have been assisted by Barnet Homes with a move to alternative suitable accommodation. A possession order has only recently been granted for the final resident and they are due to be evicted in August. Barnet Homes is currently seeking suitable accommodation for this family with the aim of moving them prior to the eviction date. The majority of households from Sweets Way have been accommodated within Barnet.</p>
24	Cllr Barry Rawlings	How many flats have been built and are in the process of being built in previous office space? How much CIL has Barnet lost through this form of permitted development	<p><b>Answer by the Leader</b> The Council has processed a number of applications for Prior Approval. At present we are only aware of four sites currently under construction, but a planned review of commencements is timetabled for summer 2015 as part of our work on the housing trajectory within the borough, and to assist Council Tax collection data. The amount of CIL lost is difficult to</p>

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25	Cllr Hugh Rayner	<p>We are spending lots of money beautifying our town centres with planters and trees and the results are spectacular, especially in Edgware where I live. A magnificent example of the council brightening up the lives of its residents! But can I please be assured that sufficient time and effort is being expended to keep these plants adequately watered in the hot weather?</p>	<p>determine as we don't know what the land use would otherwise have been.</p> <p><b>Cllr Dean Cohen, Chairman of the Environment Committee</b>  Yes. The majority of funding for the scheme has been raised by local businesses and the contract is managed by the local Town Team. It is a full maintenance contracts including watering.</p>
26	Cllr Nagus Narenthira	<p>Would the Leader confirm how many children in Colindale have been allocated their first preference place at a school, and how many school places are available in Colindale ward compared with the number of children living in Colindale ward?</p>	<p><b>Cllr Reuben Thompstone, Chairman of the Children Education Libraries and Safeguarding Committee</b>  Total on-time Reception applications from active Colindale Ward postcode - includes all preferences ( 1-6)</p> <p>Successful 1st Preferences from an active Colindale postcode  Published Admission Number (PAN), by Primary School in the Colindale Ward:</p> <p>The Orion*: 202 &amp; 94 &amp; 120  Blessed Dominic: 65 &amp; 37 &amp; 60  Colindale: 163&amp; 61, &amp; 90  Total: 430 &amp; 192,&amp; 270</p> <p>*The Orion is now located outside the Colindale Ward but the school priority area has not yet changed and currently covers the Colindale Ward.</p>



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27	Cllr Hugh Rayner	Mr Dismore has asserted that the council's own ecology report makes it clear that clearance work (of the Pavilion Way school site) should not take place between the bird breeding months of March and September, and if the scheme for Watling Park School were to be approved it should be subject to a planning condition accordingly, so the school couldn't be built in time for this autumn anyway. The scheme has now been approved. Is Mr Dismore correct in his assertion?	<p><b>Cllr Daniel Thomas, Chairman of Policy and Resources Committee</b>  No. The report on ecological matters provided with the planning application recommends that vegetation clearance associated with the development should take place either outside of the breeding bird season or under the supervision of an ecologist following the carrying out of a breeding bird survey. A condition requiring implementation of the development in accordance with this recommendation was placed on the planning permission granted on the 26th June 2015. There is no reason why the imposition of this condition would prevent the delivery of the school in time for autumn this year.</p>
28	Cllr Andreas Ioannidis	How many road traffic accidents have occurred on Oakleigh Road South since the beginning of the year?	<p><b>Answer by the Leader</b>  There has been one resulting in slight injury.</p>
29	Cllr Hugh Rayner	Graham Park Way is increasingly becoming a major communication artery as Beaufort Park, Graham Park, Aerodrome Road and Colindale Avenue developments expand together with the opening of Orion School. Can thought be given to freeing up traffic flow along Graham Park Way - as it is now with cars parked on either side it is impossible for two large vehicle to pass - resulting in traffic chaos?	<p><b>Cllr Dean Cohen, Chairman of the Environment Committee</b>  As part of current Highway Improvements to Grahame Park Way between Great Strand and the Aerodrome Roundabout, waiting restrictions are proposed to restrict parking and allow movement of traffic between these sections of road. Remaining sections of Grahame Park Way will be reviewed in due course as part of Barnet College redevelopment.</p>

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30	Cllr Amy Trevethan	The case for a joint venture model for Barnet's Education and Skill services rests on the assumption that 'income growth will increase by £9m over 5 years...through a combination of selling more services to schools...(and) to local authorities'. – CELS 12 January 2015, Agenda Item 7 - Appendix A – financial modelling summary. What market testing, if any, has been conducted to assess the level of demand for buying such these services from a joint venture with LBB?	<p><b>Cllr Reuben Thompstone, Chairman of the Children Education Libraries and Safeguarding Committee</b></p> <p>Financial modelling of potential demand was undertaken as a cautious best estimate. Through the procurement process, it is the responsibility of the bidder to satisfy themselves that they can generate sufficient income to support their guarantee of the savings to the Council.</p>
31	Cllr John Marshall	How does Barnet compare with other areas for social mobility?	<p><b>Cllr Reuben Thompstone, Chairman of the Children Education Libraries and Safeguarding Committee</b></p> <p>Barnet ranks among the very best areas in the country for social mobility. The Sutton Trust has developed a Social mobility Index measuring the attainment of children from disadvantaged backgrounds and their progression to higher education and professional occupations. Of the 533 parliamentary constituencies in England all three in Barnet come well within the top fifty, with Hendon in 10th and Chipping Barnet 2nd best nationally.</p>

In addition, a local authority must adequately explain their reasons for not placing a household in borough through a comprehensive accommodation procurement strategy and placements strategy, covering all forms of tenure. Barnet Homes is in the process of finalising a PRS Procurement Strategy and it is being extended to cover all forms of tenure. The council has a one offer only policy because there is a high demand for housing in the borough and a limited supply of homes. The judgment does not in itself make this policy unreasonable, it simply means that Barnet Homes has to ensure that offers are affordable, reasonable and take full account of a household's needs as described above. Whilst price will play an important part in that evaluation, we have always been clear that the ability to maintain excellent service quality and effective relationships with schools is more important in respect of these services – it is not about getting the cheapest bid. Only 30% of the evaluation criteria relate to financial benefit and the successful bidder will need to meet all of the objectives that have been set for the project relating to service quality, engagement with schools and meeting the MTFS savings target. A significant level of financial modelling has previously been carried out for the in-house model (with investment) and the social enterprise model. The Final Business Case will include a comparison of the final tender against those benchmarks, as well as a comparison against the current service provision.</p>

With burials and cremation Hendon offers bearing services and cd's and iPhone adaptors for their music in during the service. Brompton Grove is such a street and therefore not maintainable by public expense. The maintenance of the road rests with the residents who are responsible for the section of the road immediately fronting the property.</p> <p>However the Highways Act 1980 (s230) makes provision for the authority to instruct the residents to carry out works to remove any danger or for the authority to carry out the works themselves and recover all reasonable costs incurred from the owners.</p> <p>The management of private streets does not fall within the remit of the Council; however the Council has a general duty of the Highway Authority to ensure public safety. The council can therefore:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Write to the residents reminding them of their obligation to maintain the private street.</li> <li>• Undertake the repairs and the authority recovers the costs from the residents of the street.</li> </ul> <p>With regards to untaxed vehicles, the Council has the power to remove untaxed vehicles from adopted public highway and land owned by the Council. We do not have the same powers in regard to unadopted highway land.</p>
