SCHEME SUMMARY	
The Community Halls at the (Shurch of St Many the Virgin East Barnet have been built to

The Community Halls at the Church of St Mary the Virgin, East Barnet, have been built to increase the capacity of St Mary's to promote the flourishing of the common good among everyone living East Barnet – a diverse community of all faiths and none.

They are fully accessible buildings, and their construction has also been associated with significant accessibility works to the historic church site. These are a significant improvement to public access to the 940 year old, grade 2* listed, church building and to its churchyard as local historic and environmental assets. They are also in keeping with the identity of St Mary's as an Inclusive Church.

The Church Council also hopes that the halls will provide welcoming meeting spaces for other charitable and civic groups on a not-for-profit basis, so that St Mary's will be able to curate a hospitable public space for all the people of the local area. Among potential partners the vicar at the church has already had contact with about making the best use of these facilities are local schools; Narcotics Anonymous; the Citizen's Advice Bureau; the Women's Institute; and local Councillors and the MP for their surgeries. St Mary's has already been using the hall as a base for a local food redistribution hub in partnership with Barnet Collective, and to establish the foundations for a community pantry here. Church and non-church related groups will benefit greatly from the use of this community asset.

Due to unforeseeable circumstances, the church has been unable to meet the demands of the supplier for the remainder of the cost of renovating the hall. The ask is for this Area Committee to see the benefit of this hall has to the community and to provide funds for the shortfall.

While it is unusual to apply for funds for a project already completed, in this case it is justified by the value of the halls to the community of East Barnet and the fact that there is no other recourse to public funding as local people have raised most of the funds alongside some other support from charities.

VALUE FUR MUNET

The entirety of the planning costs, and some of the construction costs, of the halls have been generated by the congregation at St Mary's, East Barnet. Their commitment to this community initiative has been shown through significant and long-term congregational fundraising and giving.

The majority of funds for the hall's construction came from the Church Council's sale of land, on which the derelict East Barnet Parish Hall had been sited, for redevelopment as high quality residential properties. The Church Council paid CIL of £33,660 on this work, though the community hall's construction was exempt from CIL.

The funds from land sales provided most of the capital costs of construction, and an appropriate contingency as advised by our architects. However, during the building process, we have experienced significant cost increases related to a delay in sign off authorisation from the Diocese of St Albans; delays in permission to begin works from the Barnet Council planning department; delays in liaison with utilities companies; and the need to commission a significant revision to the site drainage plans.

There were also general cost rises to steel framing, doors, and site labour, due to the overall economic situation. During the budgeting and building progress we have attracted additional funding to this project from The City Churches Fund; The Diocese of St Albans; The Benefact Trust; and The Garfield Weston Foundation. A £5000 grant from the Edward Harvist Charity was also made toward the fit out of accessible WCs and the kitchen.

The halls have therefore been built as a facility for the benefit of the wider community without access to any public funds, or any funds controlled by council members, except the Edward Harvist Charity. Following a high final sum demand from our building contractor, there has been a period of negotiation involving the project's quantity surveyor and contract administrator. On their professional advice, the Church Council has now reached a reasonable and lower settlement with the contractor. It is one which, however, still exceeds the church's budget for this building and these additional sources of funds by approximately £32 000.

The value of the delivery of the hall for the community far exceeds that of the final cost of build it.

In the ward 23.4% of the population is aged 15 years and younger, which is higher than the English average and that of the surrounding wards. The hall hopes to meet the need of this younger population through providing an events space.

Since the certificate of practical completion of the halls was issued in December 2022, St Mary's has already used the halls for social and learning activities, including a course on Holy Places in different religious traditions and the discussion of 'Tax for the Common Good' in Tax Justice Week. The halls are also the base for a Sewing Circle as part of our warm places provision to tackle individual fuel poverty and social isolation in the area.

In future, the Church Council hopes that the church community will use these halls to offer events, activities and groups, particularly for children, young people and the economically vulnerable.

The Church Council also hopes that the halls will provide welcoming meeting spaces for other charitable and civic groups on a not-for-profit basis, so that St Mary's will be able to curate a hospitable public space for all the people of the local area. Among potential partners the vicar at the church has already had contact with about making the best use of these facilities are local schools; Narcotics Anonymous; the Citizen's Advice Bureau; the Women's Institute; and local Councillors and the MP for their surgeries.
