

**Council Questions to Cabinet Members

Questions and Responses**

Question 1

Councillor Duncan Macdonald

Can the Leader list the Leader listen meetings that he has led and any other Leader listens meetings that anyone else has led in a deputizing role stating who led them and where they were located?

Answer by Councillor Mike Freer, Leader of the Council

I have led the Leader Listens events in the following Wards: Finchley Church End, Hale, Underhill, Brunswick Park, Childs Hill, East Finchley and Edgware.

Councillor Offord chaired, East Barnet, Mill Hill, West Hendon and Coppetts.

I have co-chaired Leader Listens events together with the Deputy Leader in Burnt Oak, Woodhouse and Colindale.

Question 2

Councillor Brian Gordon

What work is the Council doing to help schools build links with the Police to help ensure children feel safe both in and out of school?

Answer by Councillor Fiona Bulmer

The children's service works closely with the police and welcomes the initiatives taken by the Borough Commander to strengthen the police's work with schools and the youth service.

There are 8 police officers who are based at secondary schools. The Council's youth workers and primary and secondary schools also have good relationships with the Safer Neighbourhood teams in their areas and Head teachers continue to build strong links with a range of the Borough's police teams.

This work is underpinned by the Barnet Safeguarding Children Board (now chaired by the Borough Commander) which brings together all the key agencies involved with safeguarding children and young people at both a strategic and an operational level.

Supplementary Question 2

Councillor Brian Gordon

Councillor Bulmer, in view of the amount of violence which exists around on the streets, particularly where youth is concerned, and in fact I believe that something like 27 young people have been murdered on London streets during the course of this Mayoralty, which obviously concerns us here in Barnet, do you not feel that perhaps we could be doing a little bit more as a council working with the Police, as we obviously do, and with the schools to try and combat this culture of violence which does exist, albeit less so in Barnet than many other boroughs, are there any particular ideas that you think we could promote to try and combat this unfortunate situation.

Answer by Councillor Fiona Bulmer

It clearly is a worry to us all, and I think, to young people in particular. As I visit schools many of the students do express concern about the growing culture of violence but schools in Barnet do a magnificent job, I think, in being civilising influences on students and are increasingly developing excellent relationships with the Police. And I would like to pay particular tribute to the Borough Commander who has focussed on youth crime and young people as victims of crime in particular and I know that Councillor Coleman will be talking about the Safer Communities Strategy later on. So there is always more to be done but I think there is good work to build on.

How many direct mail letters from the Leader and the Deputy Leader have been paid for and sent out by the Council to residents in Barnet in the last year – excluding Leader Listens mailings – and how much has the cost of this been to the Council?

Question 4

Councillor Susette Palmer

Are there any plans to resite the North Finchley Library, currently by Sainsbury's and designated a leading library away from the shopping centre?

Answer by Councillor John Marshall

The Council is aware that several developers have sought to redevelop the former Furnitureland site. It has been suggested that at least one would like to provide a new Library. Clearly this would have advantages over the present site as it would be on the main road. It would be irresponsible to ignore this opportunity. We will keep local residents fully informed unlike the previous administration.

Supplementary Question 4**Councillor Susette Palmer**

The trouble about the answer John is that it rather misses the point. The point I'm making is that the new site, which is at the far end away from the shops of the Furnitureland site, and which only has four parking spaces, is taking the library away from the High Street shops. Now in view of this, and since we know that in Barnet people double and even triple park, rather than walk this sort of distance, can you reassure me that you will do a consultation with library users, particularly with library users, and if you can answer this please and give me that assurance without any snide comments you'll get extra brownie points from me.

Answer by Councillor John Marshall

I'm surprised that Councillor Susette Palmer would expect any snide comments from me. Of course we will consult with library users. We won't follow the example that was set by a previous unnamed Cabinet Member who didn't consult with anyone, neither the residents nor the library users. Of course we're aware of the things she says but she must also recognise that Furnitureland is actually on the High Street, where it is at the moment is opposite Sainsbury's off the High Street. I'm well aware of the location, I'm well aware of the absence of shops. I am well aware that in certain parts of the borough a double yellow line is interpreted by some to mean that double parking is in order, but I'm sure that we will solve these problems Councillor Susette Palmer and you will be pleased that once again this administration is investing more money in new and up-to-date libraries. You should thank us and congratulate us instead of making carping comments.

Question 5**Councillor Brian Gordon**

Would the Cabinet Member accept commendation on behalf of all those concerned for the excellent organisation that went into the Holocaust Memorial Day Event at Middlesex University, which was highly professional, with very moving prayers, speeches and presentations?

Answer by Councillor Brian Coleman

Yes. This event has become a significant occasion and I am grateful to all the participants, to Middlesex University and the Council staff who worked so hard to ensure a fitting commemoration of Holocaust Memorial Day.

Supplementary Question 5**Councillor Brian Gordon**

Councillor Coleman in view of the awareness which does exist of the horrors of the Holocaust and the widespread understanding that does exist, certainly in this borough about the seriousness of racial hatred do you not agree, I'm sure you will, that it is very regrettable that we still have parties around like the British National Party, which peddle the sort of hatred which the Nazis used to peddle, albeit somewhat more subtly, but they still do this, and what particular message do you think we, as a Council, should be sending out to the borough about parties like the BNP, especially at this particular time when we're all busy with elections.

Answer by Councillor Brian Coleman

I trust in the good nature of the people of Barnet not to vote for fascist, racist parties, such as the BNP, and I look forward to them getting a derisory vote on May 1st.

Question 6

Councillor Julie Johnson

Precisely which budget will the £4m come from to pay for the recently announced replacement window works, and other major repairs on the West Hendon estate and the Dollis Valley estate? What was this money earmarked to be spent on before the decision was taken to spend it on these repairs?

Answer by Councillor Lynne Hillan

Some of the funding had already been earmarked for Regeneration estates. Also because of the progress on the Decent Homes programme the demands on the miscellaneous repairs and maintenance programme have been reduced and we have identified savings within this, to fund the remainder of the programme.

Question 7

Councillor Brian Gordon

How many "Green Flag" awards do we anticipate being won by Barnet's parks this year?

Answer by Councillor Matthew Offord

We are hoping for seven. Six re-submissions and a new location – Edgwarebury Park.

Supplementary Question 7

Councillor Brian Gordon

Councillor Offord in view of the excellent status of our parks as your answer endorses, do you not think that it's a little bit unfortunate that people still go around saying there aren't enough facilities for our youth, there aren't enough green spaces for them to play in. Should we not be , rather than sort of accepting these criticisms, obviously a lot of it comes from the opposition, should we not be encouraging our young people to use these parks a little more and encouraging the parents of children to see the wonderful green spaces we have to encourage their children to play football there, to enjoy the sports facilities there and to take advantage of these excellent open spaces which Barnet has.

Answer by Councillor Matthew Offord

The comments that I receive from members of the public show that they are very enthusiastic about the way that we are approaching our parks and open spaces in Barnet and they are particularly pleased about our being awarded six green flags and now looking for a seventh. I think some of the comments that Councillor Gordon made about the opposition, I think that's just sour grapes really isn't it, because after the years of under investment in our parks and also trying to spread the jam too thinly they realise that we've now got it right.

Question 8

Councillor Alan Schneiderman

Does the Leader think that the Local Strategic Partnership should make decisions about key public services while meeting in private?

Answer by Councillor Mike Freer, Leader of the Council

The Councillor is mistaken, the LSP by itself does not 'make decisions about key public services' as suggested in the question. The Government's recent consultation paper 'Creating Strong Safe and prosperous Communities' helpfully clarifies the status of the LSP: *'LSPs are a collection of organisations and representatives coming together voluntarily to work in partnership'....and 'provide the forum for collectively reviewing and steering public resources, through identifying priorities in Sustainable Community Strategies and LAAs. But as non-statutory bodies they are not the ultimate decision-makers on such plans. All target-setting, and consequent financial, commissioning, or contractual commitments proposed by LSPs, must be formalised through the relevant local authority, or through one of the other LSP partners (for example, if policing, or health resources are involved).'*

Supplementary Question 8

Councillor Alan Schneiderman

I understand that Councillor Freer did not want me to attend the last Local Strategic Partnership Executive meeting, but does he think it's right that members of the public are also not allowed to attend these meetings.

Answer by Councillor Mike Freer, Leader of the Council

I agree with his own government regarding public involvement.

Question 9

Councillor Bridget Perry

What does the Cabinet Member for Public Health think the above inflation increase in prescription charges will mean for residents in the Borough?

Answer by Councillor Helena Hart

A recent Citizens' Advice report found that as many as 800,000 people in England failed to collect a prescription last year due to the cost. This year the Government has increased the charge for an individual item by yet another 25 pence – bringing it to £7.10 from April 1st.

Added to the loss of the 10% tax rate band, here we have yet another measure which cannot fail to harm the most disadvantaged and vulnerable residents of the Borough.

Question 10

Councillor Anne Hutton

What process will the administration go through to decide how to spend the £8m in "area based grant" that the local authority has received from the government?

Answer by Councillor Mike Freer, Leader of the Council

The usual budget setting process will be followed and this was explained in the budget report already published:

"The Council Budget report said the following: Area Based Grant (ABG) replaces Local Area Agreement (LAA) grant in 2008/09. The various grants are aggregated by Government into a single monthly payment. Unlike LAA grant, ABG comes with no conditions and it is for the Council to determine spending priorities. This is a significant change in the funding regime, which enables the Council to review and challenge expenditure that was previously "protected" by the fact that it was grant funded."

However– ABG is now nothing more than a second allocation of Formula Grant, **but with one significant exception – there is no floor protection at the end of the three year funding period.**

Question 11

Councillor Daniel Thomas

Developing a sports and physical activity strategy for the Borough was a key recommendation in the Sport and Leisure Best Value Review, adopted by Cabinet last July. Could the Cabinet Member please tell me what progress has been made?

Answer by Councillor Andrew Harper

We have now in Barnet a Community Sports and Physical Activity Network which is well established and brings partners together on a regular basis.

I'm pleased to report that It has very quickly developed not only a Strategy for Sport, Physical Activity and Physical Education, which will be finalised within the next few months, but also four projects to attract new funding, all of which have passed Sport England's initial selection process. Together, these will ensure that the tremendous collective effort that already goes into local sport and recreation is harnessed in helping people to keep fit, providing activities for young people, developing Barnet's sporting talent and contributing to the strong sense of community that it engenders. The strategy will also ensure that we progressively strengthen the infrastructure and capacity to keep on improving what we have to offer in the Borough. I am intent on ensuring that we use local facilities and resources to maximum advantage and that the Council acts as a positive force in helping all concerned to deliver the strategy and help create an active and healthy future for Barnet residents.

Supplementary Question 11

Councillor Daniel Thomas

Would the Cabinet Member agree that what he has outlined puts paid to claims by the opposition parties that the London Borough of Barnet is not interested in sports and physical activity and especially in the claims made by the Lib Dem GLA candidate in his recent leaflet in the Garden Suburb Ward regarding community playing fields.

Answer by Councillor Andrew Harper

I am grateful for the interest that Councillor Thomas is displaying in this subject and of course I heartily agree with everything that he said, I couldn't have put it better myself I think. I know where the Lib Dem candidate is coming from I think, I believe that he's still trying to jump on a long goneby bandwagon about the closure of the Pavilion Way facility, where it will be recalled that actually what this administration was doing was seeking to achieve best value for the residents of this borough by rounding up a facility that was disused and fallen into disrepair, was no longer needed and that we're looking to replace in a much more suitable location at Woodcroft Park where we can have something that will benefit a wider range of residents both in Burnt Oak Ward and the neighbouring Wards such as Hale.

Question 12

Councillor Alison Moore

What will Assistant Cabinet Members actually do?

Answer by Councillor Mike Freer, Leader of the Council

Assistant Cabinet Members will, without receipt of any additional allowance provide support to Cabinet Members in the discharge of their portfolios.

Question 13

Councillor Brian Gordon

Please could the Leader outline how many Freedom of Information (FOI) requests and questions he has received about the Leader Listens initiative and who they were from?

Answer by Councillor Mike Freer, Leader of the Council

Most enquiries have been made by Mr Andrew Dismore MP. To date these have been handled outside of the Freedom of Information (FOI) process. However Mr Dismore has now started to use the FOI process, the average cost of responding to these enquires is £150 including the time of two Council Officers and myself.

Supplementary Question 13

Councillor Brian Gordon

Councillor Freer, Andrew Dismore seems to be playing, does he not, Andrew Dismore in his closing months, or year maybe or so, as the MP for Hendon, seems to be, does he not, taking a rather duplicitous stand on the Freedom on Information Act in that he opposed amending the Freedom of Information Act to apply to Members of Parliament to probe his and other people's activities in Parliament, yet he uses the same Act to try and undermine your excellent meetings that you have, the Leader Listens meetings, which so many members of the public much appreciate, do you not think Andrew Dismore is a complete hypocrite.

Answer by Mike Freer, Leader of the Council

It would be very tempting to simply say yes, and of course it is yes, because I do find it somewhat hypocritical that a Member of Parliament who votes against a piece of legislation applying to themselves then has no compunction applying that legislation to others, not least actually to seek out information that has actually got nothing to do with his own constituency. So, yes, I would say that Mr Dismore is a hypocrite on this particular item.

Question 14

Councillor Ross Houston

Will the Cabinet Members responsible for planning and housing confirm whether the administration supports affordable housing provision being part of every housing development?

Answer by Councillor Melvin Cohen

The Borough's Unitary Development Plan (UDP) states that the Council will seek to negotiate the maximum reasonable amount of affordable housing on sites of 10 dwellings or more, or on sites of 0.4 hectares or more, having regard to the Council's target that half the housing provision over the UDP period (up to 2016) should be affordable.

In exceptional circumstances, where the provision of affordable housing would prejudice the realisation of other planning objectives involving community benefit, the Council may consider accepting a lower amount of affordable housing in connection with a new development.

Supplementary Question 14

Councillor Ross Houston

I have one supplementary. Will the Cabinet Member responsible for planning and housing confirm whether or not the administration supports affordable housing provision being part of a re-housing development. My supplementary to this is can the Cabinet Member tell me what percentage of housing delivered last year met the 50% target in the London plan and in our UDP.

Answer by Councillor Melvin Cohen

I can't give that information off the top of my head and I will arrange for the Member to be written to.

Question 15

Councillor Wendy Prentice

Does the Cabinet Member for Transport think that, according to a report in the London Evening Standard, it is acceptable that the Head of Transport for London to have threatened to cut the Transport Operational Command Unit budget (TOCU) because the Metropolitan Police raised safety concerns over bendy buses across the capital and the routing of the 384 bus through Barnet?

Answer by Councillor Matthew Offord

No, I do not. In fact, I think it is a disgraceful suggestion.

Supplementary Question 15**Councillor Wendy Prentice**

Does the Cabinet Member not agree that this threat and the e-mail regarding the Barnet embarrassment shows an unacceptable level of political interference in transport and policing matters by those who surround the current Mayor of London.

Answer by Councillor Matthew Offord

Yes I do, and I look forward to after 1 May to that situation changing.

Question 16**Councillor Kath McGuirk**

Why is the signature street cleaning service failing to meet key graffiti removal targets?

Answer by Councillor Matthew Offord

It is not. The problem is with private sector utility companies and graffiti on private property, not on Council-owned land.

Question 17**Councillor Richard Weider**

Please could the Cabinet Member outline initial reaction, if any, from users to the newly-refurbished Edgware Library in my ward?

Answer by Councillor John Marshall

There has been a very positive response to the changes. The new toilet facility has been widely welcomed. RFID has also been widely welcomed. One resident said it 'is really impressive...it almost makes it worth paying your Council tax'. Another said it is 'Fantastic'. It made her 'feel connected to technology'. I personally was most impressed with the changes when I visited the Library.

Supplementary Question 17**Councillor Richard Weider**

Would the Cabinet Member accept my thanks as a regular user of Edgware Library for their excellent new facilities and 7 day a week opening times at Edgware Library, and can he confirm that the resources will continue to be improved providing excellent facilities and resources at Edgware Library for the increasing number of users of the library.

Answer by Councillor John Marshall

I think there's a tradition that a Cabinet Member can't bind his successor, so I don't think I can necessarily say what will happen next year and I can't bind a successor to spending even more money. But what the council does know is that Councillor Weider and his two colleagues have been very active for a very long time pressing the claims of Edgware Library, this council has listened and I am sure that they will listen in the future.

Question 18**Councillor Jim Tierney**

Does the Cabinet Member responsible for housing really believe that delivering only 8 intermediate affordable homes a year is going to solve the housing crisis in Barnet?

Answer by Councillor Lynne Hillan

During the last two years, the following figures demonstrate the numbers of affordable homes being provided in Barnet:

Supplementary Question 18**Councillor Jim Tierney**

Councillor Hillan, thank you very much for your answer and for the two grids, as an observation on the first grid, you claim 81 affordable completions which the annual monitoring report gave as 59, so there's 22 houses presumably outside Barnet, but our question was about Barnet. And my supplementary is, your housing trajectory figures show that you're not even reaching your annual London plan target for affordable housing, which is about something under 1000 affordable units a year from 2007-2017. Given that we already know that you have a shortfall of a 1000 affordable units every year for the next 5 years and the largest regeneration scheme at Brent Cross is only going to bring you about 1000, we understand, how are you going to meet your London plan target and the housing need in the borough. (inaudible) the regeneration scheme you refer to an increase via the regeneration schemes but to date you're not delivering that by any means.

Answer by Councillor Lynne Hillan

Before I answer, I just wanted to say that the figure of 81 that Councillor Tierney refers to was in an annual monitoring report. I'm not sure who produced that but I think it was the incumbent Mayor, whose name escapes me. But as you can see we've completed considerably more. With regard to the 21 of the units they were in Oriental City which is just over the borders with Brent but however we do have 100% nomination rights to this. There are going to be 1000s of houses coming on-line. As you can see you've got, did I give you the table which, the table over the page shows how many will be coming on-line. Of course they're the ones that are currently planned. There may well be more developments coming up as well, but they're the ones currently in plan.

Question 19**Councillor Bridget Perry**

As far as the Cabinet Member is aware please, are users happy with the changes made following refurbishment at Chipping Barnet Library in my ward?

Answer by Councillor John Marshall

Although the Library reopened only last week, the initial feedback has been positive.

Question 20**Councillor Charlie O-Macauley**

Does the Cabinet Member for the Environment support the Kyoto Treaty on Climate Change?

Answer by Councillor Matthew Offord

Providing 'support' for any treaty, initiative or policy is simply gesture politics – it is action, which this Administration has demonstrated, which is more valuable.

Question 21**Councillor Robert Rams**

Please could the Cabinet Member advise when a Planning Application for East Barnet School is likely to be submitted?

Answer by Councillor John Marshall

The architect will seek RIBA Stage D approval from the programme board on 25 April. If this is given the application will be submitted on 28 April.

Supplementary Question 21

Councillor Robert Rams

Can I thank the Cabinet Member for his answer, and can I also thank him, Cabinet and other members of the Council for their efforts to ensure that two brand new schools will be built in East Barnet, they're going to benefit the whole of the community in East Barnet. But can I ask when he imagines work is going to start on the new East Barnet School.

Answer by Councillor John Marshall

The hope Madam Mayor is that the work will start during the school holidays. We are determined that this shall be built on time and on budget so that the children of East Barnet can look forward to a very much better future.

Question 22

Councillor Colin Rogers

Does the Cabinet Member believe that the state of the road surface in Church Lane N2 is acceptable?

Answer by Councillor Matthew Offord

The only acceptable road condition is the one which has been resurfaced, something this Administration has made a key priority. Unfortunately it is also one which the Labour and Liberal Democrat Groups have both opposed.

Question 23

Councillor Daniel Webb

When does the Cabinet Member expect a Planning Application to be submitted for Whitings Hill School in my ward please?

Answer by Councillor John Marshall

We enter Alcatel on 14 April. If there are no challenges we will proceed on 24 April with financial close. We expect contract signature in May 08. However if there are no challenges the design and build partner will submit a planning application on 28 April. This will enable work to start during the summer.

Question 24

Councillor Andrew McNeil

Does the Cabinet Member for the Environment support the "polluter pays" principle?

Answer by Councillor Matthew Offord

I have made my position on this clear many times in the Council Chamber. I suggest the member reviews past minutes' of the debates and questions.

Supplementary Question 24**Councillor Andrew McNeil**

I thank the Cabinet Member for his somewhat peevish reply. Since I know that the Cabinet Member sometimes struggles to answer questions I will re-direct the question to his assistant Cabinet Member at the next meeting, and perhaps he or she will be better able to respond.

Answer by Councillor Matthew Offord

Once again the Member is misinformed, he can't direct a question to an Assistant Cabinet Member but I will help him out with a bit of history that he doesn't seem to have taken in in recent years, and as I remind him of his group's budget a year ago when they recommended to remove £200,000 from the road resurfacing budget. If the Conservative budget had not gone through he could not thank us now for the work we're going to engage in resurfacing this road in his ward. I think he should be thanking this administration and I also think the residents who live in his road should also be thanking us.

Question 25**Councillor Linda McFadyen**

Would the Cabinet Member for Health advise the following:

- How many people in Barnet (broken down into adults and children) are recorded as suffering from asthma (yearly figures from 2002)?
- How many people in Barnet (broken down into adults and children) are recorded as suffering from pollution related illnesses (yearly figures from 2002)?
- How many people in Barnet (broken down into adults and children) have died as a result of pollution-related illnesses since 2002?

Answer by Councillor Helena Hart

Barnet Council does not collate the requested information, which has had to be obtained from the PCT.

No data is routinely collected by the NHS in relation to what is referred to in the question as "pollution-related illnesses" – nor is such information recorded on death certificates.

So far as Asthma itself is concerned, Asthma is caused by a reversible narrowing of the airways in response to mechanical or allergic irritation. Different people respond in different ways to such irritation and may find that they develop asthma symptoms with more than one irritant. Such irritants can include (in no particular order) tobacco smoke, other particulate or gaseous air contaminants including pollen (hay fever especially due to grass pollen is a common precipitant of asthmatic wheezing), certain weather conditions (e.g. sudden change in temperature, cold air, windy days, hot and humid days) animal fur and feathers, house dust mite and exercise. Asthma can be managed by avoidance of triggers and the use of medication, usually in the form of different types of inhalers to prevent attacks occurring and to treat attacks when they do.

General medical practice data on a number of disease areas has only become available since the introduction of the new general medical services contract. It was not collected prior to that and is only collected now within certain parameters. In 2007/08, there were 17,091 people registered with Barnet GPs receiving treatment for asthma. There were 16,464 in the previous year. This data is not available in age groups and therefore represents both children and adults.

The PCT has slightly more detailed information on people registered with Barnet GPs who were admitted to any hospital with a diagnosis of asthma, and these are shown in the table below.

It should be noted that the majority of people with asthma are managed wholly by their GP. Only a very small number have asthma attacks that are sufficiently severe to require hospital admission.

There is no hospital data after June 2007 at present, and as the NHS Clearing House no longer exists data from databases prior to 2005 is difficult to retrieve and cannot be obtained within the timeframe of this request.

Question 26

Councillor Geof Cooke

Excluding the Leader Listens, how much was spent by the Council last year on resident consultation?

Answer by Councillor Andrew Harper

The Council has spent approximately £197,000 on resident consultation during the financial year just ended (1st April 2007-31st March 08). This total amount does not include costs for officer time, the Leader Listens, Area Forums, the Civic Network or any planning application consultations.

In terms of officer time, the Council employs one and half Corporate Consultation officers, to provide quality assurance and to advise on consultations carried out by services. These officers are also responsible for any corporate consultations carried out by the Council. Total gross spend on these salaries is £54,000 per annum. In addition, consultation is a key activity for the Highways department and they have spent £215,637 in officer time running and analysing the results of consultations specific to that service during the last year.

Barnet Council consults extensively because 'Putting the Community First' is at the heart of all our corporate priorities. As part of this overarching aim we endeavour to involve and consult with our local residents and services users to ensure that the services we provide meet the needs of all our communities.

Also, from April 2009, as part of the Local Government and Public Involvement Act 2007, local authorities will have a duty to inform, involve and consult with their residents and service users. The Council will be inspected on these through the new Comprehensive Area Assessment, to be conducted by the Audit Commission.

Lastly, the public equality duties placed on all public authorities means that the Council is required to actively involve defined sections of Barnet's Communities.

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
