1	Cllr Dushinsky	Leader, you recently announced that the Council would be a net-zero carbon organisation by 2030. What steps do we need to take in order to reach that important goal?	Leader	The Sustainability Strategy Framework was approved by P&R committee in December; this included the commitment to reach Net Zero as an organisation by 2030. The framework report provided information on some of the steps that the council has taken to date which support this commitment, such as energy savings measures in some councils buildings and a wholesale conversion of all street lamps to LED. Additionally, it provided an overview of the initial set of actions that the council will undertake over the next few years to help reach this commitment, such as further retrofitting and energy savings measures on council buildings, reviewing our supply chain and sustainable procurement policy, and having a fully electric fleet. These actions will be reviewed and developed further in line with the production of the full Sustainability Strategy.																					
2	Cllr Rawlings	At the last Council meeting the Conservative Group of Councillors stated in an amendment that the Council was making all financial viability assessments publicly available as and when submitted in support of a planning application, unless there was an 'exceptional circumstance' reason not to. The Council has now confirmed that this had not been happening in all cases prior to 2021. Why did the Conservatives not explain this to Full Council?	Leader	All 26 applications received in 2021 had their assessments publicly available. The answer given to the previous meeting was therefore accurate.																					
3	Cllr Prager	How much less does this Conservative borough charge in Council Tax than the neighbouring Labour boroughs? 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4	Cllr Clarke	What impact does the reduced Thameslink timetable have on the Brent Cross regeneration?	Cllr R Cornelius Chairman, Housing & Growth	The council is working with DfT and Network Rail and the Train Operating Company on the timetable for the new BXW station - this relates to both the timetable being introduced in May 2022 to reflect current demand as a result of the Pandemic and when the station is brought into service based on the timetable agreed at the Full Business Case stage. Further updates will be provided to the Housing and Growth Committee in due course.
5	Cllr Byers	Can the Leader please tell us about how the <i>Winter Festival</i> is going?	Leader	The Discover Barnet Winter Festival consisted primarily of an on-street Festive Market in Edgware Town Centre and the promotion of community and faith sector events across the borough. The Edgware Winter Festival was a success, despite taking place just after the Covid-19 Omicron variant numbers started to increase and Government advice was updated. This impacted attendance numbers, which were lower than originally anticipated. There were 12 vendors selling a wide range of items, which were well received with between 50-100 visitors to the stalls each day. The walkabout performers also garnered a lot of attention from passers-by and local businesses who commented on how happy they were to see things happening in Edgware.
6	Cllr Cooke	The Barnet Labour Group has stated unequivocally that if elected we would not build on the green belt. By means of the written answer to this question, will the Leader state whether or not he accepts that assurance?	Leader	We know that Labour say one thing in opposition and do another in power.
7	Cllr Rozenberg	Does the Leader agree that TfL proposals to reroute the 143 bus route down Archway Road will worsen travel links in Barnet, by preventing direct access to the Whittington Hospital for residents in Finchley Central and Hendon, and by making it more difficult to visit Highgate Village?	Leader	Yes, I agree and several residents have written to me to express a similar view, however I am not confident that TfL will listen to Barnet residents.
8	Cllr Wardle	In a recent Newsletter, the Barnet Labour Party claimed they would focus on getting the basics right... starting with weekly waste collections. Would the Leader	Leader	Barnet Council has provided weekly refuse and recycling collections since c.2001. The UK Government has recently set out its framework for new waste management arrangements in England within the Environment Act. Barnet along with other local authorities is liaising with DEFRA and Ministers on the detail to be set out in regulation and guidance that will shape and

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		please point out to Labour that we already have weekly bin collections? Unlike neighbouring Labour controlled boroughs.		direct future waste collection arrangements. The council will adhere to any new statutory requirements accordingly.
9	Cllr Conway	Why does the Council spend so much money on communications but often get such low responses to public consultations?	Leader	<p>Communicating and engaging with residents is a fundamentally important part of the council's work. A point well demonstrated during the ongoing COVID-19 crisis, where the need for strong and continuous communications and engagement with residents, communities and businesses was vital to support vaccinations and keep residents safe and informed of government guidance, and ensure businesses got the support they were entitled to.</p> <p>The council's formal consultations do experience quite wide variations in responses - typically ranging between 30 and 2000 responses. However, that isn't always a good indicator how well residents feel involved or how engaged they are in council activities. We know that 66% of residents feel that the council keeps them well informed (Residents Perception Survey, Autumn 2020) and our data on our strategic communications campaigns suggests that we are effective in reaching residents. For example, data from the Discover Barnet Presents...Summer Festival (June- Sept 2021) shows that our social media output generated 685,000 page views with engagement rate of 5% (1-5% classed as good by marketing industry standards), with around 2 million+ (across all our channels) "opportunities to see" information on the festival, resulting in over 12,000+ residents attending events. Also in October 2021, we joined forces with the Andy's Man Club to launch a digital campaign on men's suicide prevention. This was designed to raise awareness of male suicide and promote sign up to the StayAlive app and our data suggests that the app was downloaded 7,568 times – far exceeding our target of 3500 – and that there was a 31.3% increase in new users (compared with August &amp; September in London), as well as a 4.85% increase in the usage time by regular users of the app.</p> <p>We are not complacent though and are keen to continue to improve how we engage and communicate with residents.</p>
10	Cllr Bokaei	What are the Leader's most proud Council moments from 2021?	Leader	<p>2021 has been another year dominated by COVID-19 and the need to respond to the ongoing impact of the pandemic. Teams across the council have worked hard to support residents by facilitating testing (included periods of surge testing), contact tracing and to promoting vaccinations, as well as wider 'how to stay safe' messages, through our network of volunteer health champions and communications campaigns.</p> <p>Throughout the disruption and challenges of the pandemic we have maintained a strong focus on our strategic priorities and on delivering services.</p> <p>We published the Barnet Plan (2021-2025) which sets out the council's vision to provide the best possible services for residents in communities where there are opportunities to grow and thrive, and where everyone feels safe. This also set out our intention to do more in collaboration with</p>

			<p>partners across the borough and to explore how we could take more a more place-based approach to meet resident needs. We have also developed and implemented the Delivery and Outcomes Framework to report progress. This is underpinned by £6.2m of additional resource across a range of priorities and robust financial management, building up reserves and balancing the budget.</p> <p>We launched a new area-based Street Cleansing Operating model in April 2021, investing £600,00 in the Service and increasing the number of staff in the service from 77 to 115 employees. In 2021, the Street Scene service have emptied over 3500 litter bins every week and swept over 300 roads every week. Waste collections and missed bin performance total 324,000 collections per week (almost 17 million per year) with a missed lift rate of 0.03% - which is the lowest rate in London.</p> <p>We have strengthened our capacity to tackle issues like fly-tipping and anti-social behaviour by recruiting an additional 16 enforcement officers to establish a team of 21 officers, operating on a ward basis and undertaken a strategic review of Barnet's Community Safety CCTV requirements. Our schools have done a brilliant job of managing the impacts of COVID -19, keeping schools open and ensuring our children and young people could safely access high quality education and learning opportunities. We published the Corporate Parenting strategy, stepped up our communications to children and young people on accessing mental health support and ran 3 holiday activity campaigns. We launched the Parenting Hub in November, which will provide specialist support to families across the borough and provided care to large than ever numbers of Unaccompanied Asylum-Seeking Children. Ofsted undertook a Children's Services focused visit in June and reported in August that we continued to improve services to children in care in Barnet and that the vast majority of children in care benefit from living in placements that meet their individual needs and impact positively on their experiences and progress. We have continued to bring health and care together, working with health and VCSF partners to develop the Barnet Integrated Care Partnership focusing on Same Day Access &amp; Discharge, implementing the Integrated Discharge Team, Integrated Care Pathways and clinical support to care homes. There has been a strong focus on mental health throughout 2021 - the Suicide Prevention Partnership 2021-25 was established, and we ran a borough wide suicide prevention campaign in the Autumn. We have consulted on the Domestic Abuse and Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) Strategy 2021-2024 and have started the process of securing "White Ribbon" accreditation (White Ribbon is the UK's leading charity in engaging with men and boys to end violence against women). We have continued to deliver our housing development and regeneration programme with securing over £1.7m of funding from the Brownfield Land Release Fund to support the delivery of 252 affordable homes in the borough and invested around £500m in the Barnet Group new build and acquisition programme to</p>
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				<p>deliver 1400 new affordable homes for rent. We have continued to progress the proposals for the Hendon Hub and stepped up our support for town centres including a flagship shop local campaign (Discover Barnet) and provided the first Discover Barnet Presents...Summer Festival. We have invested £750,000 to deliver an expanded skills and employment offer in response to COVID and are on track to have supported 1000 people into work (working in partnership with BELS, BOOST and the Shaw Trust) are implementing a major programme of investment to improve digital connectivity across 14,000 Barnet Homes properties, with over 2,000 properties connected to gigabit speed broadband services since February 2021. We have continued to support the major growth scheme at Brent Cross with construction of Brent Cross West Station and junction works underway. In September we unveiled our first community mural on Claremont Way and a three-storey eco-friendly community hub – the first building to be completed in the 180-acre park town - opened in November. 2021 has seen us make significant progress on our Net Zero journey. We have provided 150 electric vehicle charge points across the borough to help in the transition to electric vehicles and secured £3.5m of government funding – the largest grant to a council in the country thus far - to install a further 500 charging points. We have also benefited residents by securing over £1m of funding to retrofit Barnet social housing through the Green Homes Grant scheme and have secured £6m to reduce river and surface water flooding in the Silk Stream catchment area. And in December the council announced its commitment to becoming a net zero council by 2030. There is a lot to be proud of and staff across the organisation have worked hard all year to deliver for residents. It was particularly pleasing to see three of our teams recognised as sector leaders with the Finance Team, (Finance Team of the Year – Councils, Public Finance Awards, 2021), Parking team (Front Line Award, British Parking Awards, 2021) and Adults Social Care (Health and Social Care, Local Government Chronical, 2021) – winning national awards.</p>
11	Cllr Rich	As the London Borough of Barnet is the landlord of Pontall's Allotments N3 and it is alleged that the managing Committee is evicting vulnerable persons, can the Leader please provide a full clarification of what is happening there?	Cllr D Cohen, Chairman, Environment	<p>The boroughs allotments sites are all run under self managed leases. Under these leases the council does not have the power to intervene on disputes in relation to individual tenancies. This is a matter between the Allotment Society and the Tenants. specifically in relation to Pontalls Allotments, a County Court decision was made on 22nd December 2021 in relation to "Claimants vs Pontalls Allotments Ltd (PAL)". Judge Raeside QC awarded PAL possession of two plots that had previously been let to the claimants; PAL were defending issue of eviction notices. PAL had terminated the tenancies in each case based on a 30-day notice. A subsequent challenge was launched by the claimants based the notification period. PAL issued updated 12-month eviction notices, which are specifically provided for under allotment legislation. The plots were therefore lawfully ended 12 months after the notices in April 2021. The Judge ruled that the 30-day eviction notices (issued under the contracts) were not sufficient to terminate the tenancies because PAL were obligated to serve in each case a notice under section 146 of the Law of</p>

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				Property Act 1925, which requires the setting out of details of each tenant's breach(es) of his/her tenancy agreement, stating that the tenant must remedy if possible, and allowing a reasonable time to remedy.
12	Cllr Grover	In a recent Newsletter, the Barnet Labour Party claimed they would focus on getting the basics right... starting with missed waste collections. Would the Leader please point out that we already have exceptionally low numbers of missed bins – by any measure, the least in London and one of the lowest in the country.	Leader	In the Financial Year 2021/22, from April to December, just 0.04% of all domestic collections were reported as missed. There is no national or regional standard for measuring missed bins so it is not possible to provide a direct comparison however the council believes its missed bin rates indicate excellent performance.
13	Cllr McGuirk	What can the Council do to further support local businesses given the continued impact of Covid-19 following the spread of the Omicron variant?	Cllr R Cornelius, Chairman, Housing & Growth	<p>The Council is currently working with local strategic partners to offer more support to businesses negatively affected by Covid-19. From January 2022 this will include:- Working with Arts Council England to award grants to arts, culture and recreation businesses- Additional financial support for Barnet's town teams to deliver projects designed to increase town centre footfall- More than £5m (part of the government's Covid-19 Additional Relief fund) to fund business rates relief for non-public facing companies in the retail, leisure, culture and hospitality sectors who have been ineligible for previous relief schemes - Targeted, one-to-one business support schemes in Burnt Oak, West Hendon, Finchley Central and North Finchley town centres- A comprehensive borough-wide programme of training and support addressing employer and employee skills and knowledge gaps delivered by Middlesex University and Barnet &amp; Southgate College, plus funded memberships to the Federation of Small Businesses- An updated programme of Temporary Street Space Fund Parklets, enabling businesses to continue trading while managing social distancing</p> <p>The Council will also shortly be introducing two Government funded business support grant schemes. - Omicron Hospitality and Leisure Grants (OHLG). This is a nationally set scheme for which Barnet have received £1.776m in funding. Awards will only be available to eligible businesses who are liable for business rates, who will receive £2.7k if their rateable value is below £15k; £4k if their rateable value is between £15k and £51k; and £6k if their rateable value is above £51k.- Omicron Additional Restrictions Grants (OARG). This will be a locally determined discretionary scheme with some centrally set criteria, Barnet have received £1.095m.</p> <p>Clarification is required on the guidance provided by government before opening up to applications to either scheme and there is a meeting scheduled for the 10th January with the Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy to assist. Applications will be invited as soon as both schemes are set up and finalised.</p>



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14	Cllr Brayne	<p>The North London Waste Authority's new incinerator at Edmonton was given the green light last month by both Conservative and Labour councillors: only the Liberal Democrats oppose it. Campaigners claim that the plant will emit 700,000 tons of CO2 per year. Does the Council agree with this figure, and if so, what are its plans to offset these emissions under its emerging Net Zero strategy?</p>	Cllr D Cohen, Chairman, Environment	<p>The net carbon impact of the new Energy Recovery Facility (ERF) is expected to be 28,000 tonnes of carbon dioxide equivalents each year. This calculation has been developed using the scientific standards set by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) (Guidelines for National Greenhouse Gas Inventories – 2006) and the UK’s Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Energy Recovery for Residual Waste – A carbon-based modelling approach – February 2014). In 2019, a Carbon Impact Screening report was produced for the North London Waste Authority (NLWA) by Ramboll, a world leading thermal engineering company, to compare the carbon impact of the new ERF to the alternative of sending non-recyclable waste to landfill. It was prepared in line with the standards set by the IPCC, in which guidance states that biogenic waste (like food, paper and wood) should not be included in national emission inventories for greenhouse gasses. This is because plants sequester carbon when they grow. In line with this guidance, the report divides household waste into fossil content (e.g. plastics) and biogenic content. It is expected that around 55% of the waste treated by the new ERF will be biogenic and 45% fossil. Following IPCC standards, only the fossil content is included when calculating greenhouse gas emissions. The report shows that the fossil content from north London’s residual waste is expected to have an impact equivalent to 308,560 tonnes of carbon dioxide each year. To establish the effective realistic carbon impact of the new ERF, it is vital to consider the displacement of heat and power generated by other energy sources. The report follows the standard set by DEFRA for carbon intensity modelling, which is clear that a combined cycle gas turbine power plant is the appropriate counterfactual for assessing energy generated by an ERF. In addition to displacing power plants that use virgin fossil fuels, the ERF will recover metals from residual waste for recycling. This will avoid the carbon-intensive process of extracting virgin metals from the ground. Following this scientific methodology, the net CO2 emissions from the new ERF are predicted to be equivalent to 28,000 tonnes of carbon dioxide every year as a greenhouse gas emission. Sending the same amount of waste to landfill would generate 215,000 additional tonnes of carbon dioxide equivalents every year. That is the same carbon impact as putting 110,000 extra cars on the road. Landfill produces significantly more greenhouse gasses than energy recovery because a) methane is an extremely potent greenhouse gas, and b) thousands of additional lorry movements would be required to transport the waste outside of north London. The new ERF is therefore part of the solution for tackling the carbon impact of north London’s waste. To further reduce carbon emissions, a project to consider how carbon capture can be incorporated is underway.</p>
15	Cllr Richer	<p>Can I congratulate the Chairman of Adults &amp; Social Care committee for the recent adult care national</p>	Chairman, Adults & Social Care	<p>Barnet, as part of our partnership with Camden, Enfield, Haringey and Islington, won the national LGC (Local Government Chronicle) award for adult social care in 2021. Barnet initiated the adult social care partnership programme between the 5 Councils just over 4 years ago, with key work areas on care homes, learning disabilities, the care sector workforce and joint work</p>

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		<p>award, and ask what successes he believes we achieved to receive it?</p>	<p>with the NHS. In each of these areas the programme has strong evidence of improved outcomes for residents and the system, financial savings and / or increased external investment into social care. Dawn Wakeling is the lead director for the partnership. We won the award for our response to the Covid 19 pandemic, where through joint work we were able to deliver improved outcomes for residents: 1. Our comprehensive response to wave 1 of the pandemic (Feb – Apr 2020): a. We increased home care capacity by over 50% in very short timescalesb. We created new integrated stepdown services that helped residents regain independence, in a matter of weeksc. We provided over 5 million PPE items free of charge to the care sectord. We secured early access to testing for care staff, provided comprehensive Infection Prevention and Control training and increased clinical support for care providerse. Providers valued our support – some quotes from care home managers: “I must say that your support, any time we needed you, made us more strong and confident in the job that we do.” “I think that this support has meant that as managers and providers of services, we didn’t feel overwhelmed.”2. Rapid recruitment into care (Feb – April 2020)a. The 5 councils had created a free to use recruitment portal for care providers - Proud to Care North London. Using this, we developed a rapid recruitment campaign where any resident could express an interest in working in care and we would quickly match them into a role that would make a difference (such as reablement, home care or care home worker)b. As part of the London pandemic response we were asked to scale this to London widec. Over 2,000 London residents came forwards (c. 200 in Barnet) of which over a third were under 30. d. We matched around 700 of these into roles in care which provided residents with meaningful work at a time when large parts of the economy were closed and increased our capacity in critical services responding to the pandemic. The approach was so successful that London ADASS are now working with us to develop it into a permanent London wide offer3. After action review of wave 1 of covid with care providers (summer 2020)a. Due to the significant impact covid had had on residents receiving care we agreed with Councils, NHS partners and care providers to lead an in-depth after action review to look at what we could learn and how we could strengthen arrangements and support for care providers in the event of future wavesb. We engaged with all parts of the system, including c. 60 care providers, residents and families, and looked at an international evidence base to form 40+ recommendationsc. Some of our key successes were:i. Agreed policy across the North Central London ICS that no one that is covid infectious or a covid contact will be discharged to bedded social care but will instead be care for in an NHS setting. We were the first ICS in London to achieve this and one of the first in the country ii. Every resident in bedded care has access to a device to speak to family and friends and access medical careiii. Significant staff training and wellbeing programme, with lots of support to care workers and registered managers to help them cope with the strains of</p>
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				working through the pandemic. 75% reduction in covid deaths in wave 2 compared to wave 1. 16	Cllr Schneiderman	Although lagging behind most other councils, Barnet has now belatedly published a sustainability framework to form the basis of a sustainability strategy. Will the borough's residents, environment and community groups be given a meaningful opportunity to influence the strategy unlike in many other council consultations? Will the strategy have clear targets, timelines and funding plans?	Leader	As noted in the Sustainability Strategy Framework report, we will be undertaking public engagement in the next few months (before the pre election period) to help shape the development of the strategy and test the content of this framework. This will include events with a number of stakeholders including residents, young people, businesses and community groups. A full public consultation will also be undertaken in the summer to help shape the final strategy.
17	Cllr Mearing-Smith	In a recent Newsletter, the Barnet Labour Party claimed they will freeze council tax next year. The Labour Mayor of London is likely to raise his council tax take by 8.8%, down from 9.2% for the current year. Are there any circumstances under which the Leader would ever consider believing the Barnet Labour Party?	Leader	Sadly not as the Barnet Labour Group in my view are prone to exaggerate and mislead.
18	Cllr Mittra	How many properties of Barnet Homes and other social housing providers have had their bin collections cut from twice weekly to once weekly?	Cllr D Cohen, Chairman, Environment	The council provides statutory weekly collections of recycling and refuse to all households in Barnet in line with its Household Recycling & Waste Policies published in 2018. Prior to this the council provided collections from some locations more frequently than once a week, however these informal arrangements were brought in line with the council's Household Recycling & Waste Policies in 2018. The council works with all social housing providers to ensure that effective waste collection services are provided to residents.
19	Cllr Stock	What Council projects is the Leader most looking forward to seeing in 2022?	Leader	In 2022 we will maintain a tight focus on providing high quality services to residents and businesses in the borough, to ensure that it remains Family Friendly, Healthy, Thriving, Clean, Safe and Well Run. Supported by firm grip on council finances we will take responsible budget

			<p>decisions, ensuring we have the resources we need to deliver.</p> <p>Our residents are at the heart of all we do and that is why we will continue to roll out measures to improve our customer services and ensuring that when residents and service users do engage with the council that they have a good experience. This means tightening our internal processes and embedding our “Make Every Contact Count” approach.</p> <p>2022 will see the adoption of our first Sustainability Strategy. This will set out our ambition and pull together the strategies and activities that we will implement to become a net zero council by 2030 and a carbon neutral borough as soon as possible thereafter. We have secured £3.5m (the largest to date) government grant to install a further 500 electric vehicle charge points by November 2022 and residents and businesses can expect to see more from us on how they can do their bit and help us all achieve our sustainability goals.</p> <p>In December 2022 we expect to see the opening of the Brent Cross West station, marking a very significant milestone in the Brent Cross Cricklewood Regeneration Programme and we will be taking forward our plans for the Hendon Hub which will provide a brand-new state-of-the-art library, an additional 100sqm of community space; public health, community facility; an improved public realm; green spaces and community facilities benefiting everyone who lives and works in Hendon. It is also hoped to include a neighbourhood community safety team office.</p> <p>Residents will continue to see the benefit from our housing and development programme in local areas and neighbourhoods through the work of the Area Committees and investment of the Community Infrastructure Levy supporting the schemes that matter most in that area.</p> <p>The Chipping Barnet Area Committee will be bringing forward three greenspaces schemes, providing new outdoor gym equipment in Swan Lane Park, New Southgate Park and Riverside Park. The Silk Stream Bridge will create a 'treetop' walk across the river, linking West Hendon Playing Fields to more than 2,000 new homes. The construction of the bridge provides an opportunity to remove invasive species, such as Himalayan balsam, from the area, improve wildlife habitats and enhance biodiversity. It will also create new pedestrian routes, linking residents to the open spaces of the Welsh Harp and West Hendon Playing Fields, the subject of a c£20m investment by the council. Residents on the West Hendon Estate are very supportive of the project. Re-positioning the bridge is unfortunately not straight forward. Moving it would require a comprehensive re-design, add very significantly to build & development costs, require a new planning application and re-negotiation of the footings without the assistance of a Compulsory Purchase Order (which was in place for the current route). Not proceeding with the bridge would inhibit movement between the regenerated estate and the playing fields and remove one of the key elements of the scheme masterplan as approved in 2013. The Council continues to receive ecology and biodiversity advice, via consultancy arrangements, and our emerging draft Sustainability Strategy will include considerations around the natural environment in the future. It's also the case that we have a large number of asylum seekers temporarily accommodated in hotels, some of whom are known to access foodbanks, which could be influencing the data. Beyond this there are factors beyond the scope of local government or local community action, such as rising housing costs, changes to food stocks and welfare reform policies. Of course, one of the biggest factors influencing the growth of people accessing foodbanks in 2021 has been COVID-19 and the ongoing economic impact of the pandemic and we recognise the very significant contribution of foodbanks and wider community mobilisation in supporting our COVID response.</p> <p>We have also seen a significant benefit from the Barnet Food Hub which is able to put food to good use that would otherwise be wasted, and so supports our Net Zero ambitions. The Hub (run by our VSC partner the Barnet Together Alliance working closely with the Felix Project and Fair Share and large corporate donors) works with both tinned and fresh food and can accept and store perishable items that foodbanks are unable to take. These can then be transformed into meals which sees surplus food being used and cuts down on food waste. For social care, this definitely applies to CQC registered providers of home care, supported living and extra-care. To work from 1st April, staff in scope will need to have had their first dose by 3rd February 2022 at the latest. The Domestic Abuse Act has reinforced the requirements to support survivors of domestic abuse and the council is currently reviewing its VAWG strategy to reflect these changes and to enhance the support provided to victims. The GLA have been granted funding for London to provide safe accommodation and support services. Barnet Homes is bidding to the Mayor's London Domestic Abuse Safe Accommodation Framework to enable a specialist domestic abuse housing and floating support team providing trauma and gender informed assessments and support together with specialist training and acquiring Domestic Abuse Housing Alliance Accreditation (DAHA) accreditation for housing management services. The council, through its Domestic Abuse and VAWG Services and Children's Services have established mechanisms for supporting victims of crime and abuse. Trauma-informed mental health support for victims and survivors of abuse, crime and violence underpins our approach to working with victims. We have already established much of the specialist support outlined in the Bill through provision of Integrated Clinical Practitioners, Independent Sexual Violence Advisors and Independent Domestic Violence Advisors. Further, Restorative justice approaches are used to bring those harmed by crime or conflict and those responsible for the harm into communication in our Youth Justice Services to prevent conflict, build relationships and repair harm by enabling people to communicate effectively and positively; it is an approach that can be used in schools, workplaces and communities. The council will continue to follow the Victims of Crime Code of Practice (Victims Code) which came into effect in April 2021 in our work with victims and partners in the criminal justice system. The Victims Bill which is out to consultation until 3 February 2022, will further strengthen our approaches to supporting victims, by extending these core principles to all vulnerable or intimidated witnesses and victims (defined as all child witnesses under 18 and any witness whose quality of evidence is likely to be diminished because they are suffering from a mental disorder or physical disability or has significant impairment of intelligence and social functioning and/or victims of sexual offences and modern slavery offences). It will also support our engagement with communities affected by crime and anti-social behaviour to give communities a stronger voice in making our neighbourhoods safer and strengthen accountability.

Regular meetings are being held with Thames Water.</p> <p>Thames Water has identified ‘under reporting’ of sewage flooding as one of their key issues. They have stated that this ‘under reporting’ is the reason why they are unable to identify the cause of the sewage flooding in most of the cases.</p> <p>To help address this, the Barnet webpage was updated (April 2021) to include important phone numbers and various reporting tools for sewage flooding. (See extract below)</p> <p>The reason for sewage flooding is often due to the overload of the sewers and their inability to cope with the extreme rainfall events. In extreme rainfall events the surface water is diverted into foul water lines - to protect property flooding but this can lead to sewage overflows on footpaths or greenspaces. The Council is actively working to progress with Sustainable urban drainage schemes in the borough to reduce the load on Thames Water sewers and working in partnership with them to achieve this. For example, Thames Water is a key partner in the Barnet Council led £6m Silk Stream Flood Resilience Innovation (SSFRI) project. As part of this project, sustainable urban drainage schemes will be put forward to reduce the load on Thames Water sewers.</p> <p>We submitted a funding bid to Thames Water as part of their surface water management programme last year to assess the feasibility of a wetland in Friary Park (storing rainfall runoff), aiming to reduce the foul flooding in the area.</p> <p>Misconnections can significantly increase the risk of foul flooding and sewage overflows. We have drafted information/advice to educate local communities to ensure rainwater and foul pipes are connected in right way, surface to surface and foul to foul.</p> <p>The Watling Park sewage overflow is being considered as part of the Silk Stream Flood Resilience Innovation (SSFRI) project; for which thermosensors are being installed in the Thames Water network to identify the ingress of foul water in surface water network.</p> <p>An agreement is being signed with Thames Water to allow data sharing of the flooded areas and properties (within the borough) impacted by sewage flooding in the July 2021 event.
