General points

The following procedure is based on Regulations made by the Secretary of State under the Licensing Act 2003 ("the Hearings Regulations") which may be viewed or downloaded from the website of the Department for Culture, Media and Sport by following links from www.culture.gov.uk

The procedure is intended as a general framework to ensure natural justice and a fair hearing. The conduct of individual hearings may vary slightly according to circumstances and the discretion of the Chairman. In all cases, however, this general framework will be followed.

The procedure allows each party a maximum period of 5 minutes in which to present their case (Regulations 16 & 24). At the end of the time allowed, the Chairman will terminate the presentation and the hearing will proceed in the form of a discussion led by the authority to explore points of dispute. The discussion will not be timed.

The procedure is subject to periodic review and amendment to reflect best practice and relevant legislative changes. An updated version of this procedure is published as soon as possible following any such amendments.

Governance Officer

- To seek nominations for Chairman
- Elect Chairman
- Hand over to the Chairman

Chairman

- Introduces him/herself and Members of the Committee, and outlines their roles.
- Introduces Licensing, Legal and Governance Officer.
- Explains that Legal and Governance Officers will be present during the Committee's deliberations to advise only, and that the Licensing Officer will be excluded from deliberations.
- Asks parties present to introduce themselves.
- Outlines procedure to be followed.
- Asks all parties to confirm their understanding of the procedure.
- Clarifies any aspect(s) of the procedure where any parties are uncertain or asks Legal or Governance Officer as appropriate to clarify.

Governance Officer

- Informs Committee of absent parties.
- Details persons whom a party is seeking permission to represent them at hearing.
- Panel confer regarding permission.
- Chairman announces decision regarding permission.

Licensing Officer presents the report to the Committee

 Is a statement of the facts including details of the application and operating schedule, relevant policy details, detail representations made, a chronology of events and highlights the points on which the Authority requires clarification.

Applicant

 Presents opening submissions and clarifies points raised by Authority in notice of hearing. Time allowed 5 mins.

Other parties

 Presents opening submissions either in person or by spokes person Time allowed 5 mins per interested party.

Note regarding use of video evidence

Video evidence must be in DVD format and will form part of the relevant party's five minutes opening submission. Any party wishing to use video evidence must submit a copy to the Authority along with sufficient, identical extra copies to serve on all the opposing parties – i.e. if the applicant is submitting it, there must be enough copies for all parties making representations and if a party making representations is submitting it there must be a copy for the applicant. The recording must be edited down to the highlights, containing only relevant matter which relates to the written representation previously submitted. In addition, a description of how, when and where the video was recorded and what it contains must be submitted. These must be supplied to the Authority at least five working days before the hearing.

Members question Licensing Officer on Policy

Discussion

Chairman leads a discussion concentrating on points of dispute:

Chairman asks Applicant what he disputes in other parties' submissions, and asks other parties to comment.

Chairman proceeds through all objectors dealing with all matters of contention.

When Chairman feels all matters have been thoroughly discussed and all parties have been given a fair and equal opportunity to comment and make representations, she/he closes discussion.

Determination

There are two procedures depending on whether or not determination is to be made at the end of the Hearing or within five working days of the Hearing. This later announcement of determination is permitted in terms of the Legislation for certain types of applications.

<u>Chairman</u> informs all present that the Committee will deliberate, that Legal and Governance Officer will remain to advise but will not be part of decision-making process, and that all others must leave (under Regulation 14).

- Parties, apart from Legal and Governance Officer, leave the room.
- The Committee deliberates, with advice as required from Legal and Governance Officer, and reaches a conclusion. The Legal officer may assist, as required, in formulating the wording of the determination.
- Parties return.
- Chairman reads out determination, and advises it will be sent in ⁶

- writing to all parties.
- Opportunity for determination to be clarified by any interested party who is unclear.
- Chairman gives advice about appealing against the determination.
- Chairman thanks all for attending and closes the meeting.

...Within five working days of the hearing

- Chairman explains requirement to determine the Hearing within five workings days, and advises that the Committee will proceed to deliberate and announce the determination within that time.
- During deliberations, Legal and Governance Officers remain to advise on law and procedure as required. The Legal Officer may assist, as required, in formulating the wording of the determination. The Licensing Officer plays no part in the determination and withdraws for this part of the proceedings.
- Chairman advises all parties that they will receive written notification of the determination within five working days of the Hearing date, together with general information on how to appeal against the determination.
- Chairman thanks all parties for attending and invites the applicant, objector(s), other party(ies) and the Licensing Officer to leave.

Information on Appealing against the decision

You may at any time before the expiration of a period of 21 days from notification appeal to Willesden Magistrates' Court, 448 High Road London England NW10 2DZ (Telephone 020 8955 0555, DX 110850 Willesden 2) by way of Complaint for an Order. The Court may either dismiss the appeal, substitute for the decision appealed against any other decision which could have been made by the Licensing Authority or remit the case to the Licensing Authority to dispose of it in accordance with the directions of the court, and can make such order as to costs as it thinks fit.

3. Agreements

The applicants have been in communication with the Police during the application processes. These discussions have led to the applicants agreeing to amend their application to include the following conditions. Please note that should the application be granted these conditions will automatically be attached to Annex 2 of the Premises Licence.

- Stewards with an appropriate level of experience shall be present at all events. The numbers
 of stewards required are to be based on a risk assessment carried out the event organiser.
 Advice from the police will be given where required
- In the event that a children's area is provided it will be monitored by stewards (who are DBS checked) at all times and signage will be displayed requiring parents/ legal guardians not to leave children unattended
- The stage to be supervised by stewards at all times when a performance is taking place
- Music will remain under the control of the event manager.
- A point of contact will be advertised for residents to contact the event manger if they have any issues, such as noise disruption.
- A member of the Mill Hill Neighbourhood Forum shall be present at all times the town square
 is being used for the purpose of this premises licence. As such, anybody in this supervisory
 capacity will have been DBS checked and will be fully briefed on his/her responsibilities to
 promote the four licensing objectives.

- A First Aid station will be set up in a prominent place
- There will be no external promoters solely running events using this premises licence
- Barnet Police Licensing team will be notified by email of any event to be held in conjunction
 with this licence where alcohol will be sold at least 5 clear working days prior to it taking
 place.
- Activities involving live or amplified music between 2000 hours and 2300 hours will take place no more than once per calendar month (This has been requested to protect the residents nearby from regular noise disturbance)
- The DPS of this licence must ensure they complete a written authority for those selling alcohol where they do not hold their own personal licence. A copy of this must be kept in the event log book.
- The person in charge of the event must maintain a log book at each event which will contain the following:
 - 1 The full premises licence (or certified photocopy)
 - 2 Details of all the stewards working that event including their contact details
 - 3 An itinerary of the event with times and names of persons participating where applicable
 - 4 Any incidents reported to the event manager

A full copy of the agreement can be seen attached to this report in Annex 2.

4. Representations

The Licensing Team have received 14 valid representations from members of the public and one from the Mill Hill Ward Panel (containing the details of 10 members). These representations relate to the licensing objectives of the prevention of crime & disorder, the protection of children from harm and prevention of public nuisance.

Responsible Authorities

The Licensing Team have not received any representations from any of the responsible authorities.

The representations can be seen attached to this report in **Annex 3**.

5. Attaching conditions

The operating schedule, which is part of the application, includes certain additional steps that the applicant will take to protect the licensing objectives. These will become enforceable conditions, should the licence be granted. Additional conditions may be attached to the licence if the committee thinks it appropriate.

The Committee must have regard to all of the representations made and the evidence it hears, and is asked to note that it may not attach conditions or reject the whole or part of the application merely because it considers it desirable to do so. It must actually be appropriate in order to promote the licensing objectives.

In relation to conditions, the statutory guidance at chapter 10.8 states that "The licensing authority may not impose any conditions unless its discretion has been engaged following receipt of relevant representations and it is satisfied as a result of a hearing (unless all parties agree a hearing is not necessary) that it is appropriate to impose conditions to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives.

Full Copies of the Councils Statement of Licensing Policy, the Statutory Guidance to the Act and the Council's Guide to Good Practice at Licensed Premises will be available at the Licensing Sub Committee hearing or in advance if required.



I recently became aware of the notice for a License Application posted there. (Application number 05042019 from Barnet Council website).

I wish it to be known that I am vehemently opposed to the License Application under the Licensing objective of 'Protecting Children from Harm'.

During the past few months I have become aware of reports circulating that a prominent member of a number of Mill Hill social media and entertainment sites has a history that would make it inappropriate for him to be given access to children or photographing them. The nature of this application, especially one so wide reaching both as to duration and event, makes the concerns even greater. The application is primarily being made in the name of Mill Hill Neighbourhood Forum. I am equally aware that such organisations as the Mill Hill Neighbourhood Forum, even when asked, have failed repeatedly to conduct DBS checks on this particular person. The prospect of such a person attending such events in the Town Square in a semi-official role, being overseen by an organisation that fails to conduct any proper or adequate checks, as well as the possibility/likelihood of photos being taken of children at these proposed events, would quite obviously be a clear breach of the Licensing objective to 'Protect children from harm'. This License Application would potentially affect the safety of my children and their overall wellbeing whether they attended or not. I consider the protection of children to be paramount in any society and therefore must repeat my objection to this license application and ask that the Council ensure that this application is rejected forthwith.

I write to strongly object to the 'Granting/Approval' of the above application for 'License'.

I am a resident of Brockenhurst Gardens and my corner property backs on to the area this Neighourhood Forum are referring to as the Mill Hill Town Square. The address of this 'Square' it is actually Brockenhurst Gardens as the road signage states and the residents of Brockenhurst gardens are the 'Neighbourhood'.

In 2003 my house was burnt to the ground as a result of a passerby setting fire to my garden fence. At the time the fire started and spread to the house my family and I were still in bed. This was a serious and potentially life threatening fire in which we lost everything. As the Broadway entrance to Brockenhurst Gardens was always an emergency access to the road the removal of this access has caused concern to me and other residents. Increased parking, in the road could potentially impede fire engine access from the Station Road end of Brockenhurst Gardens. This could have fatal consequences if such an awful fire/event should ever occur in the future.

Currently, when on market days, there has been live music it can be heard inside my house. In fact on occasion it is as if they have been playing in the house. Not only could the music be heard but also the electric instruments have caused the house to vibrate. I am a longstanding resident of Brockenhurst Gardens and although now retired have always been a law abiding and tax paying citizen. In my retirement I have earned the right to enjoy the peace and quite of my own home and to choose whether or not I wish to listen to music, the volume, and indeed the type of music I wish to listen to. Furthermore, I do not think that I should be prohibited from going to bed early or to enjoying my garden with my children and grandchildren due to unacceptable noise levels.

In addition to the above, many of my neighbours have young children who need to go to bed early for their well being and education. And most of the residents in Brockenhurst Gardens are working people who have to be up early in the morning.

In addition to the above I strongly object to:

Sale by retail of Alcohol. – Brockenhurst Gardens is a residential road. There are no public amenities on the roadway, such public toilets. Therefore, the sale of alcohol on the street, as well as encouraging antisocial behavior and noise will result in the service road leading off Brockenhurst Gardens and other areas being used as urinals.

If the Mill Hill Forum wishes to establish a venue for the sale of alcohol and other entertainments then they should find a suitable commercial property from which to do it.

At this point is also worth noting and commenting on the fact that there are never any police in Mill Hill.

Live Music / Recorded Music/ Performance of Plays/ Performance of Dance and Exhibition of Film – I object for the reasons previously stated above. I presume that London Borough of Barnet Council or the so called Neighbourhood Forum do not intend to triple glaze our the windows in the properties in Brockenhurst Gardens and even if they did it would not solve the problem of disturbing the peace and making the social use of our gardens untenable.

The neighbourhood (and by that I mean the residents of Brockenhurst Gardens') would have no control over the noise levels if a License was granted.

Furthermore the residents of Brokenhurst Gardens have ongoing issues with rat infestation made worse by the constant dumping of rubbish and litter and the inconsiderate waste disposal of the local commercial premises. The council has done little or nothing to address these issues. The residents have already seen an increase in the number of rats and amount of rubbish as a direct correlation to previous market days and events such as those, which are now proposed/stated on the application for License. This can only further exacerbate the problems.

I do not see that holding events such as those requiring a music or alcohol license in this tiny area is of any benefit to Mill Hill. There is no parking and it is ridiculous to think that people are going to travel to Mill Hill to gather in this tiny areas. Music events and festival affairs would be better placed in the parkland on Flower Lane or in the park in Dawes Lane.

Having discussed with other neighbours on our Road, Brockenhurst Gardens, we have been unable to establish that any of the neighbours/residents of Brockenhurst Gardens actually sit on this forum.

I would, along with my neighbours, also suggest that if it is the intention of the Mill Hill Neighbourhood Forum to improve Mill Hill, then issues such as the state of the pavements, rough sleepers, begging, rubbish dumping and littering and rat infestation should be on top of their agenda. A good starting place would be addressing the proprietors of the commercial premises and their commercial bins!

I trust that the foregoing expresses fully my objections.

Not only could the music be heard but also the electric instruments have caused the house to vibrate. As a Longstanding resident of Brockenhurst Gardens a law abiding and tax paying citizen, I have a right to enjoy the peace and quite of my own home and to chose whether or not I wish to listen to music, the volume, and indeed the type of music I wish to listen to. Furthermore, as an individual who has to be up early in the morning to go to work during week because I contribute by way of income tax and council tax, I do not think that the I should be prohibited from going to bed early or to enjoying my garden due to unacceptable noise levels. In addition to the aforementioned, many of my neighbours have young children who need to go to bed early for their well-being and education.

In addition to the above I strongly object to:

Sale by retail of Alcohol. – Brockenhurst Gardens is a residential road. There are no public amenities on the roadway, such public toilets. Therefore, the sale of alcohol on the street,

as well as encouraging antisocial behavior and noise will result in the service road leading off Brockenhurst Gardens and other areas being used as urinals.

If the Mill Hill Forum wishes to establish a venue for the sale of alcohol and other entertainments then they should find a suitable commercial property from which to do it.

At this point is also worth noting and commenting on the fact that there are never any police in Mill Hill.

Live Music / Recorded Music/ Performance of Plays/ Performance of Dance and Exhibition of Film — I object for the reasons previously stated above. I presume that London Borough of Barnet Council or the so called Neighbourhood Forum do not intend to triple glaze our the windows in the properties in Brockenhurst Gardens and even if they did it would not solve the problem of disturbing the peace and making the social use of our gardens untenable.

The neighbourhood (and by that I mean the residents of Brockenhurst Gardens') would have no control over the noise levels if a License was granted.

Furthermore the residents of Brokenhurst Gardens have ongoing issues with rat infestation made worse by the constant dumping of rubbish and litter and the inconsiderate waste disposal of the local commercial premises. The council has done little or nothing to address these issues. The residents have already seen an increase in the number of rats and amount of rubbish as a direct correlation to previous market days and events such as those, which are now proposed/stated on the application for License. This can only further exacerbate the problems.

There is nothing to be gained in Mill Hill by holding events such as those requiring a music or alcohol license in this tiny area. There is no parking and it is ridiculous to think that people are going to travel to Mill Hill to gather in this space. Music events and festival affairs would be better placed in the parkland on Flower Lane or in the park in Dawes Lane.

I further object on the basis that it is not clear who is responsible for public safety in the area that the so called Neighourhood Forum are calling the Town Square. (Again I say 'So called' as I have been unable to establish that any of the neighbours/residents of Brockenhurst Gardens actually sit on this forum. The matter of responsibility for public safety will be addressed with the Council and Matthew Offord in a separate letter.

As the Broadway entrance to Brockenhurst Gardens was always an emergency access to the road the removal of this access has caused concern to the residents. We have already seen a very serious and potentially lethal house fire on the road in 2007. I, along with other residents, am concerned that with increased parking, fire engine access could be impeded with fatal consequences if such an awful event should occur in the future.

Finally, this notice regarding this application was only displayed two weeks ago despite being dated the 1^{st} April 2019. This would appear to be an action to prohibit or prevent the

residents of Brockenhurst Gardens from having adequate time to consider the implications to the proposed license and to raise vehement objections.

As a resident of Brockenhurst Gardens I am not familiar with Mr. Gillett or the actions of the Mill Hill Neighbourhood Forum. However, I assume this organization, which has previously permitted/organized stalls and live music in the area of Brockenurst Gardens known as the Town Square, is a public body, which presents public accounts. Please advise which area of Barnet Council vets these accounts, as they must be a matter of public record.

I would also suggest that if it is the intention of the Mill Hill Neighbourhood Forum to improve Mill Hill, then issues such as the state of the pavements, rough sleepers, begging, rubbish dumping and littering and rat infestation should be on top of their agenda. A good starting place would be addressing the proprietors of the commercial premises and their commercial bins!

I trust that the foregoing expresses fully my objections.

I wish to object to the application from John Gillet who resides in Mill Hill East and is chairperson of the Mill Hill Neighbourhood Forum and whom I believe will be the Designated Premises Supervisor and hold Personal Licence to sell alcohol for the Premises Licence for Regulated Entertainment and the sale and Supply of Alcohol for the premises known as Mill Hill Town Square, NW7 3LL (known to locals as the Pot Park). The application is for 7 days a week 10.00am to 11.00pm Friday, Saturday and Bank Holidays and 10.00am to 21.00pm Sunday, Monday to Thursday. The thought of that being a daily or weekly occurrence would not be acceptable and I would be very concerned as to the level of disruption this would cause.

I have lived at 51 Brockenhurst Gardens for over 13 years.

My objection is based on my concern that this new licence may increase the possibility of public nuisance for the many dwellings nearby, including my own property.

I am particularly concerned about noise nuisance as this already happens occasionally when an entertainment event is held in the Pot Park/Mill Hill Town Centre.

Because it is an open-air venue the noise carries very easily across our homes. The current number of events where amplified equipment is used is just about bearable and I accept this. However, potential multiple events in the same week, week after week is not acceptable with the level of noise generated in an open space which is inadequately acoustically designed for musical events. (I understand that there is currently a clause attached to the existing licence restricting the number of events that will be held in a year). Event times I can hear what people are saying from my bedroom window and the additional conversations over music will be much louder bearing in mind that performances are happening in the open air and therefore no sound proofing or insulation is possible to protect noise transfer to nearby residential properties.

Constant events will, as well as the noise, encourage groups to use the events and there will inevitably be, as news spread to our surrounding areas antisocial behaviour of those attending some these events due to the selling of alcohol which would encourage a drinking culture on those nights which, will invariably make its way out into the local neighbourhood. This will not benefit the local community as the noise will disrupt sleep of both children and adults. Additionally, depending on the nature of the events, I would be concerned about the possibility of an increase in low level disorder when attendees are leaving this openair location.

In view of the above, I would urge the Licensing Authority to refuse the application and instead encourage the continued use of current practices or Temporary Event Notice when needed.

To whom it may concern,

I am writing with respect to application 05042019 from the Barnet Council website - a licensing application for the pocket park on Brockenhurst Gardens.

As a resident of Brockenhurst Gardens NW7 with two young children, I absolutely object to this Licensing application for the following reasons:

- 1. The pavements in Brockenhurst Gardens are already dangerous and a trip hazard due to uneven surfaces, broken paving slabs etc. Any increased footfall will only worsen the issue.
- 2. There is already an issue with fly tipping behind the Boots store. We are concerned the impact of increased littering will have on the square as a result of this license being granted and on the surrounding area in terms of unsightliness but also health wise with increased rodent numbers.
- 3. Serving alcohol late into the evening will increase the amount of anti social behaviour which is unacceptable on a residential road and puts local residents at increased levels of risk regarding safety. Given the unfortunate news earlier this year of the murder of a shopkeeper on Mill Hill high street, and various other increases in crime in the local area of late, granting this license would seem to only invite more trouble.
- 4. The music from the square can be heard loudly from the properties in Brockenhurst Gardens impacting family life and in particular our children's bedtime. Any noise should be subject to the same time restrictions as construction so as not to impact on local residents.
- 5. Further, during the past few months I have become aw are of reports that a prominent member of a number of Mill Hill social media and entertainment sites has a history that would make it inappropriate for him to be given access to children or photographing them. The nature of this application, especially one so wide reaching both as to duration and event, makes the concerns even greater. The application is primarily being made in the name of Mill Hill Neighbourhood Forum. I am equally aw are that such organisations as the Mill Hill Neighbourhood Forum, even when asked, have failed repeatedly to conduct DBS checks on this particular person. The prospect of such a person attending such events in the Town Square in a semi-official role, being overseen by an organisation that fails to conduct any proper or adequate checks, as well as the possibility/likelihood of photos being taken of children at these proposed events, would quite obviously be a clear breach of the Licensing objective to 'Protect children from harm'.

This License Application would potentially affect the safety of my children and our family life - there are already gangs of kids that hang around Brockenhurst Gardens making us feel unsafe walking to and from the shops and I would certainly not like to offer them any more opportunity to congregate on our road, particularly when there's alcohol involved.

I therefore must ask that the Council ensure that this application is rejected forthwith and consider the impact such a license would have on the local residents.

To whom it may concern,

We David and Katie Sims of Brockenhurst Gardens, Mill Hill, NW7 live very close to the Town Square at the end of the road. We recently became aware of the notice for a License Application for the Mill Hill Town Square NW7 3LL for the Sale by Retail of Alcohol alongside the Provision of "Regulated Entertainment" – to the Public.

We strongly object to the application on the following grounds...

1) The prevention of crime and disorder

- Serving alcohol throughout the day and late into the evening will increase the amount of anti-social behaviour which is unacceptable on a residential road and puts local residents at increased levels of risk regarding safety.
- There is already an issue with fly tipping behind Boots. We are concerned the impact of increased littering will have on the square and surrounding area in terms of unsightliness but also health wise with increased rodent numbers.

2) Public safety

- The pavements in Brockenhurst Gardens are already dangerous and a trip hazard due to uneven surfaces, broken paving slabs etc. Both our children have tripped and injured themselves as well as other members of the family. Any increased footfall will only worsen the issue. I have already raised the issue with Cllr Val Duschinsky however nothing has been addressed to date.
- As above. Serving alcohol throughout the day will put local residents at increased risk from antisocial behaviour.
- As above. Increased littering will encourage more rodent and fox activity which puts our family and young children at more risk. We have already had to deal with a rat infestation recently and this will only exacerbate the problem.

3) The prevention of public nuisance

- The music from the square can be heard loudly from the properties in Brockenhurst Gardens impacting family life and in particular our children's bedtime. Any noise should be subject to the same time restrictions as construction so as not to impact on local residents.

There are far too many negatives associated with the application and I would therefore urge you to dismiss it out of hand.

We write to strongly object to the Granting/Approval of the above application for the license.

We are residents of Brockenhurst Gardens and our property backs onto the area known as The Town Square, currently already we have Markets on this space and there has been live music in the past which on these occasions has been very loud and at times felt like they are in our Garden playing which in turn means the house inside is noisy which for us as a family is a problem. As our son is physically unable to walk long distances, he enjoys the use of our garden and having these events at the back of our garden will stop him and us as a family from using and enjoying our private space.

We have an 11-year-old son who suffers from left side Hemiplegia and suffers a lot with muscle aches and migraines due to this condition, he relies a lot on sleep to help him cope with his daily pain, the rest is crucial for him so a good night's sleep is paramount. If his sleep is disturbed, he can find it extremely difficult to get back to sleep due to his condition.

The loud music we have experienced in the past has meant he isn't getting to sleep until much later after the music has stopped which means this has an effect on how he functions the next day as a result of the lack of rest for his muscles so music played in the evening would be detrimental to our sons health.

Mill Hill has seen an increase in petty theft and more serious crime in recent months and in the evenings does not feel safe to walk around, adding an Alcohol licence to a public place will increase the amount of anti-social behaviour which in turn could cause more problems for an already crime ridden area.

Brockenhurst Gardens has a significant problem especially around the Town Square Area with waste, rubbish, Litter and Rat infestation so Adding food stalls and more litter/Rubbish to the area after and during events will not help this ongoing issue.

Brockenhurst Gardens has no public toilets or facilities for this licence to be put in place for an event on the Town Square for over 12 hours and as a result will lead to people urinating down the ally ways and Brockenhurst Gardens itself which none of the residents want.

We as a family have no objections to Mill Hill coming together as a community but feel there are better more well-equipped spaces available in Mill Hill for community events which are better suited than a small concrete space in a residential quiet street.

We hope that you will consider the opinions of those that will be most affected and we hope these reasons make it clear that we most vehemently objection to this Application.
