	Our stretch of Bridge Lane includes Yew Tree Court, which is a building which contains 34 separate flats. Parking spaces are constantly being occupied from morning till evening by employees and customers of the businesses on Finchley Road and Temple Fortune Parade. This makes it extremely difficult, if not impossible, for any of the local residents to find parking. This is exactly why CPZs are introduced, in order to protect residents' parking spaces. We believe this to be a straightforward matter and hope that Barnet Council agree.

	On the other side (exiting from Lyttelton Playing fields) cars come quickly along Kingsley way to and from the Traffic lights. No real warning signs I can see and many young kids cross in groups running across the road.	
	One Problem: Falloden Way Traffic Lights Issues	
-	When Kingsley way lights are RED cars are turning into Kingsley way (unseen) from either direction and accelerating into Kingsley way. When Kingsley way lights are GREEN Cars rush fast down from Ossulton to beat the lights or rush fast along Kingsley way towards the lights.	
	The suggestion is: -At the Fletchers exit; Remove one car space and install a raised Kerb in its place so walkers on the Fletchers side can see (and be seen) over the Parked and in traffic cars.

To request the following action - Traffic slowing measures on Oak Lane and Long Lane, double yellow lines at entrance to Oak Lane.	We are due to undertake some traffic and speed surveys in the adjacent side roads to the A1000 as part of the monitoring of the A1000 Cycle Scheme. These are scheduled to be undertaken after the lockdown in March 2021. We will investigate the traffic calming measures if the survey results indicate high traffic speeds on Oak Lane. We will also investigate the possibility of extending the double yellow lines further into Oak Lane, subject to consultation.

On the other side (exiting from Lyttelton Playing fields) cars come quickly along Kingsley way to and from the Traffic lights. No real warning signs I can see and many young kids cross in groups running across the road.  One Problem: Falloden Way Traffic Lights Issues  When Kingsley way lights are RED cars are turning into Kingsley way (unseen) from either direction and accelerating into Kingsley way. When Kingsley way lights are GREEN Cars rush fast down from Ossulton to beat the lights or rush fast along Kingsley way towards the lights.  The suggestion is:  -At the Fletchers exit; Remove one car space and install a raised Kerb in its place so walkers on the Fletchers side can see (and be seen) over the Parked and in traffic cars.	In 2017, the single yellow line outside Lyttelton playing fields were upgraded to Monday to Sunday 8am to 6.30pm. The parking restrictions outside Fletchers Gardens were removed to compensate the loss of parking.  The Highways Service can investigate the possibility of re-introducing a single yellow line outside Fletchers Gardens with parking restrictions Monday to Sunday 8am - 6.30pm to reflect those on the opposite side of the road. They can also introduce a dropped kerb with tactile paving either side of Kingsley Way near the entrance to both parks with SLOW road markings. This will help pedestrians crossing between the two parks, it should be noted that this will result in the loss of approximately 4 parking space outside Fletchers Gardens.  'CHILDREN CROSSING KEEP CLEAR' is not a standard road marking and it is not contemplated as variant in the TSRDG.

After all, when the Garden Waste bins were first introduced, it was publicised that they could accommodate such materials.	<ul> <li>(i) Windfalls such as apples can be placed in garden waste bins at the appropriate time of year, and accepted on a temporary basis at the processing facility. Fruit and vegetable waste cannot be placed in the garden waste bins at other times of year.</li> <li>(ii) Previously the garden waste collected was sent to an In-vessel Composting Facility, which could also accept food waste. The processing arrangements for garden waste have since changed so that garden waste is sent to an outdoor composting facility at lower cost, where food waste cannot be accepted.
