on the kerb as they do on the rest of Dollis Road on the hill towards Finchley Central Tube station or remove parking all together. A further solution would be to install traffic calming measures - either a single lane chicane or a series of sleeping policemen. At the very least a speed camera with high visibility signage should be erected to deter motorists from speeding. In addition, to provide safe access to our properties, we request a pedestrian crossing to be installed in front our houses, ideally the Pelican crossing (with traffic lights), or at least a Zebra Crossing and remove some on-street parking to provide better visibility to pedestrians and drivers. And speed bumps to be installed in both directions close to our properties, enforcing cars to reduce speed when

1. WHY THIS REPORT IS NEEDED

1.1 The following petitions from Barnet residents have been received prior to the deadline for submission of petitions.

Petition: Traffic Calming Measures in York Road, EN5

Lead Petitioner: Samin Ahmadzadeh

Ward: Barnet Vale

Number of signatures 2

Details: 99

As residents of York Road in New Barnet we are writing to you 1) to lodge our serious concerns about sharply increasing dangers from vehicular traffic, and 2) to demand that you take urgent action to avoid injury or indeed fatalities.

In recent months, traffic on York Road has increased significantly. Along with the increased volume of traffic, we have witnessed an alarming increase in speeding and reckless driving on what is ultimately a narrow, residential road in a neighbourhood with many children and vulnerable residents. Among the residents of York Road are The Starlings Nursery, Rainbow Cubs and Rosa Morison Day Centre (the latter on Gloucester Road, but adjacent to and making extensive use of York Road).

The sharp increase in traffic and dangerous driving poses a clear and present danger to the health and safety of the residents. It is plain to see that unless the Council takes urgent preventative steps it is only a matter of time before there is a fatal accident on York Road. Urgent action must be taken now to avert disaster. Anything less would be both unreasonable and reckless and demonstrate an abject disregard for the safety of residents.

Specifically, we demand the following:

- 1) Lowering the speed limit on York Road to 20mph from the current 30mph
- 2) The installation of traffic cameras to deter and penalise dangerous driving

We note that 20mph is a speed limit common on many residential and/or heavily trafficked narrow streets in Greater London and that beyond the clear safety benefits highlighted above, the lower 20mph speed limit would cut carbon emissions and reduce air pollution. Residents would also benefit from reduced noise pollution.

Furthermore, there would be no negative externalities from the reduction of the speed limit from 30mph to 20mph, particularly if such moves were coordinated with other similar roads to create a 20mph zone, like the zone recently created in the Hadley/Clifford/Woodville Road area.

Given the alarming increase in traffic volume and excess speeds on York Road, it is imperative that the Council take urgent and appropriate action. Failing to promptly reduce the speed limit and install traffic cameras is very likely to lead to serious injury or death in the short to medium term.

We look forward to your early engagement.

Details:

We the undersigned petition the council to Remove single yellow lines from people's driveway entrances as they are inappropriate Review the extent of single and double yellow lines in general as we believe them excessive Stop penalising those who cannot afford electric cars with higher permit prices Change the controlled parking zone times to one or two separate hour long restrictions between the hours of 0830-1830 instead of the full 10 hours. This is preventing carers for the elderly and visitors of residents from parking. Stop dealing with hospital staff parking problems with controlled parking zones, because you create more problems which you resolve with more controlled parking zones. Remove Quinta Drive from the controlled parking zone. It is a 13 minute walk from the hospital and unlikely to be used by staff.

The extension of the controlled parking zone around Barnet Hospital was done after consultation in 2020 of the roads surrounding Hill Close as well as Trinder Road, Trinder and Pepys Crescent. Quinta Drive comprises a greater number of multiple occupancy blocks than most roads in the area and has suffered a decimation of parking spaces for residents, with excessive use of yellow lines and pay by phone parking bays. Residents are now required to pay for fewer places at a terrible time with the cost of living crisis looming. The housing stock in this area is low-cost ex-council housing. Residents unable to afford electric cars are being penalised with higher permit prices. On top of this, inability to pay has seen residents parking in surrounding areas without controlled parking zones, thus creating the environment to create more controlled parking zones. Enough is enough. The council needs to find a way to deal with the hospital and its parking issues without penalising and inconveniencing thousands of residents.

Summary

This report provides Members with an update on the CIL budget allocations for the North Area Committee, to enable consideration of applications for funding during 2022/23, and an update on the Road Safety & Parking budget allocations for 2022/23 and the status of current schemes.

Officers Recommendations

- 1. That the North Area Committee notes the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funding available for allocation during 2022/23, as set out in paragraph 7.2.2 of this report and in Appendix 1.
- 2. That the North Area Committee notes the CIL amount and re-allocated underspends & overspends in paragraph 2.1 of this report
- 3. That the North Area Committee notes the Road Safety & Parking Fund available for allocation during 2022/23 in paragraph 7.2.5 of this report and as set out in Appendix 2.

1. WHY THIS REPORT IS NEEDED

- 1.1 This report indicates the allocation of part of the Community Infrastructure Levy ("CIL") to the North Area Committee (Area Committee). This will enable the Area Committee to determine the amounts that can be allocated at this, and future meetings.
- 1.2 This report also sets out the allocation of Road Safety & Parking Budget, part of the Community Infrastructure Levy ("CIL") to the North Area Committee.
- 1.3 The amounts approved from the CIL reserve were based on estimates from the service department, with a view that should the estimate prove to be understated there would be no further call on the Area Committee budgets without an additional approval. Expenditure exceeding 15% of the original estimate will require an explanation to enable the Area Committee to agree any additional funding.
- 1.4 Detail as to the activity to date of this Area Committee and the balance available are attached as Appendix 1 to this report.
- 1.5 This report also includes an update of the Road Safety & Parking budget allocation and schemes as Appendix 2 to this report.

2. CIL activity

- 2.1 The latest position shows expenditure to December 2022. The total amount of underspends for 2022/23 is £10,987 which is added back into the CIL reserve allocation (see Appendix 1).
- 2.2 The over & underspends from the prior year schemes that are still open will impact on the total Area Committee available balance, until the schemes are certified as complete.

2.3 All CIL funding allocations should be submitted in accordance with the approved CIL funding application guidelines detailed in the Policy & Resources Committee report dated 24 May 2021. The new guidelines detailed in the Policy & Resources Committee report dated 8 June 2022 are subject to the conclusion of the public consultation to be carried out.

3. Road Safety & Parking Budget Activity

3.1 The latest position as set out in Appendix 2 shows the agreed allocations to date and the remaining budget available for future schemes.

4. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

4.1 Funding has been allocated to various organisations and/or projects and this will enable the Area Committee to note the amount available for future allocation.

5. ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS CONSIDERED AND NOT RECOMMENDED

5.1 No alternative options were considered

6. POST DECISION IMPLEMENTATION

- 6.1 <u>CIL Activity</u> Decisions can be made by the Area Committee to allocate funding to organisations from the Area Committee general reserves based on member supported applications and from the Area Committee CIL reserve for requests for infrastructure related surveys and works and anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on the area.
- 6.2 **Road Safety & Parking Activity** Approved Road Safety & Parking schemes arising from member requests, petitions or area committee report funded schemes to be implemented by Highways in line with timelines provided.

7. IMPLICATIONS OF DECISION

7.1 Corporate Priorities and Performance

- 7.1.1 The current corporate plan (Barnet Plan 2021-2025) was adopted in March 2021. Following the May 2022 elections, the council has a new administration, and a new corporate plan consistent with the new administration's priorities will be brought forward shortly.
- 7.2 Resources (Finance & Value for Money, Procurement, Staffing, IT, Property, Sustainability)

CIL Activity

- 7.2.1 An annual allocation of £1.8m is made to Area Committees from 2022/23. The funding has provisionally been agreed to be allocated based on population within each Area Committee and projected CIL receipts subject to public consultation and consideration of an Equality Impact Assessment ('EQIA') being carried out for each Area Committee (after the public consultation in respect of those recommendations requiring consultation).
- 7.2.2 The total available to this committee as of January 2023 for the allocation to new schemes is £404,757.
- 7.2.3 Appendix 1 lists all the schemes in progress as at the time of publication and shows a detailed breakdown of how the available balance is derived and noting that £65,249 has been allocated to new schemes in 2022/23.

Road Safety & Parking Activity

- 7.2.4 An allocation of £450,000 was made to the Road Safety & Parking Budget for the financial year 2022/23.
- 7.2.5 The total amount available as at the date of this meeting, totals to £35,165, this is the total amount available for allocation to new schemes. This considers all of the agreed allocations authorised by the Director, Highways & Transportation.
- 7.2.6 Appendix 2 lists all the schemes where budget has been allocated broken down by Area Committee as at the time of publication with listing of the schemes in progress and summarises the headline balance position.

7.3 **Social Value**

7.3.1 CIL is itself a mechanism for providing social value from private sector investment.

7.4 Legal and Constitutional References

7.4.1 CIL is a planning charge that was introduced by the Planning Act 2008 Part II to help deliver infrastructure to support the development in an area. It came into force on 6 April 2010 through the Community Infrastructure Levy Regulations 2010 as amended ("the Regulations"). Section 216(2) of the Planning Act 2008 lists some examples of infrastructure which CIL can fund. i.e. roads and other transport facilities, flood defences, schools and other educational facilities, medical facilities, sporting and recreation facilities and open spaces.

- 7.4.2 On 1 September 2019, the Regulations were amended under The Community Infrastructure Levy (Amendment) (England) (No.2) Regulations 2019 ("2019 Regulation"). Part 10A of the 2019 Regulation requires the Council to publish "annual CIL rate summary" and "annual infrastructure funding statements". These statements replaced previous Regulation 123 lists. The "annual infrastructure funding statement" must include a number of matters listed in the new Schedule 2 including details of how much money has been raised through developer contributions and how it has been spent. Both the "annual rate CIL summary" and the "annual infrastructure funding statement" must be published on the Council's websites at least once a year.
- 7.4.3 The Localism Act 2011 introduced requirements that a 'meaningful proportion' of CIL income is allocated to parish councils to support their neighbourhood infrastructure requirements. Under Regulation 59A(5) of the Community Infrastructure Levy Regulations 2010 (as amended) a charging authority must pass 15 per cent of the relevant CIL receipts to the parish council for that area; this is limited by Regulation 59A(7) to a cap of £100 per dwelling in the area of the Local Council.
- 7.4.4 Regulation 59F enables a similar application of CIL receipts in cases where, as in Barnet, a charging authority does not have a local council structure, the local or neighbourhood CIL is passed to Area Committees.
- 7.4.5 Under the Regulations, regulation 59F(3) prescribes how the neighbourhood CIL may be used in these circumstances and provides that it may use the CIL to support the development of the relevant area by funding:
 - 7.4.5.1 The provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure: or
 - 7.4.5.2 Anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on an area.
- 7.4.6 There is statutory requirement that the Council as charging authorities must have regard to the government 'CIL Guidance'. This Guidance provides additional guidance on how neighbourhood CIL funds should be used where there is no local council in place. Paragraph 146 of the CIL Guidance states that the "charging authority...should engage with the communities where development has taken place and agree with them how best to spend the neighbourhood funding". Charging authorities should set out clearly and transparently their approach to engaging with neighbourhoods. The CIL Guidance goes on to explain that the use of neighbourhood CIL funds should match priorities expressed by local communities, which should be obtained through consultation undertaken "at the neighbourhood level". This does not necessarily prevent the Council from allocating neighbourhood CIL funds to borough wide (or larger) projects or initiatives, providing that they meet the requirement in regulation 59F. If the Council decides to depart from the CIL

Guidance (i.e. by not allocating funds in accordance with priorities expressed by local communities), it should have and give clear and proper reasons for doing so.

- 7.4.7 In accordance with Article 7.5 Committees, Forums, Working Groups and Partnerships of the Council's Constitution, the terms of reference of the North Area Committee (Barnet Vale, East Barnet, Edgwarebury, High Barnet, Mill Hill, Totteridge & Woodside, Underhill and Whetstone) includes responsibility to:
- 7.4.7.1 Provide an opportunity for any resident to raise matters affecting the area (except matters relating to licensing and planning applications).
- 7.4.7.2 Responsibility for all area specific matters relating to the street scene including parking, road safety, transport, allotments, parks and trees.
- 7.4.7.3 Consider area specific matters as agreed with the Chair.
- 7.4.7.4 Consider matters relating to Town Centre regeneration and designating conservation areas.
- 7.4.7.5 Determine the allocation of the Community Infrastructure Levy funding within the area subject to sufficient of the budget allocated to the committee being unspent.

7.5 **Risk Management**

- 7.5.1 To mitigate the guidelines becoming out of date, a review of the arrangements will be completed annually.
- 7.5.2 Area Committees have requested clarification of the CIL funding eligibility criteria to ensure that funded schemes are within eligibility guidelines. This is a possible reputational risk to the Council. The proposed new guidelines provide clarity on CIL eligibility.

7.6 Equalities and Diversity

- 7.6.1 An Equalities Impact Assessment (EqIA) will be carried out after public consultation upon the new proposed CIL funding allocation to be based upon population for each Area Committee and the findings of the public consultation and the EqIA are to be considered by the Area Committee.
- 7.6.2 The Equality Act 2010 outlines the provisions of the Public Sector Equalities

 Duty which requires Public Bodies to have due regard to the need to:
 - 7.6.2.1 Eliminate unlawful discrimination, harassment and victimisation and other conduct prohibited by the Equality Act 2010.
 - 7.6.2.2 Advance equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it.
 - 7.6.2.3 Foster good relations between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it.

- 7.6.3 Relevant protected characteristics are: age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation.
- 7.6.4 The broad purpose of this duty is to integrate considerations of equality into day-to-day business and keep them under review in decision-making, the design policies and the delivery of services.

7.7 Corporate Parenting

Not applicable in the context of this report

7.8 Consultation and Engagement

- 7.8.1 A public consultation has been undertaken prior to adopting the proposed new guidelines, priorities and provisional CIL funding based on population of each Area Committee. The results are being collated and presented to Policy & Resources committee for review.
- 7.8.2 Members will be encouraged to engage residents and community groups in their wards to raise awareness of Area Committees and the opportunities they provide for delivering community-led improvements to their local areas. Officers will also work with their community networks to promote the Area Committees.

7.9 **Environmental Impact**

There are no direct environmental implications from noting the recommendations. Implementing the recommendations in the report will lead to a positive impact on the Council's carbon and ecology impact, or at least it is neutral.

7.10 **Insight**

7.10.1 Members should consider using insight data during the consultation process to formulate local priorities for 2022/23, and when proposing schemes for Area Committee consideration.

Summary

1. WHY THIS REPORT IS NEEDED

1.1 Applications for funding from the Committee's allocated NCIL budget have been raised. The summary of the applications is in the table below, and the detailed applications are in Appendix 1:

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.2 The Committee is requested to decide in respect of each application submitted by Ward Members for Neighbourhood CIL Funding, in line with its terms of reference set out in Article 7 of the Council's Constitution.
- 1.3 Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) is a planning charge that was introduced by the Planning Act 2008 Part II to help deliver infrastructure to support the development in an area. CIL is a standard charge collected from developers on a rate per square metre basis and the funds raised are spent on infrastructure to support the development of an area. Part of CIL funding is allocated to the Neighbourhood Portion and managed by the three Area Committees: North, East and North.

2. ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS CONSIDERED AND NOT RECOMMENDED

2.1 Not applicable; Members of the Council are able to submit applications for Neighbourhood CIL funding to the Area Committee via Members' Items. As a result, the Committee are requested to consider and determine the applications submitted by Ward Members. Therefore, no other recommendation is provided from Officers.

3. POST DECISION IMPLEMENTATION

3.1 Post decision implementation depends on the decision taken by the Committee, and the assessing officer's recommendation.

4. IMPLICATIONS OF DECISION

4.1 Corporate Priorities and Performance

4.1.1 The current corporate plan (Barnet Plan 2021-2025) was adopted in March 2021. Following the May 2022 elections, the council has a new administration, and a new corporate plan consistent with the new administration's priorities will be brought forward shortly.

4.2 Resources (Finance & Value for Money, Procurement, Staffing, IT, Property, Sustainability)

4.2.1 An annual allocation of £1.8m is made to Area Committees from 2022/23. - 4.4.2 Council Constitution, Article 2 Members of the Council, Section 2.3 states that a Ward Member will be permitted to have one matter only (with no subitems) on the agenda for an Area Committee where the Member is submitting a request for CIL funding to an Area Committee Budget relating to their Ward. Members' Items for CIL funding Budget must be submitted 10 clear working

days before the meeting. Items received after that time will only be dealt with at the meeting if the Chairman agrees they are urgent.

4.5.1 None in the context of this report.

4.6 **Equalities and Diversity**

- 4.6.1 Requests for Funding allow Members of a Committee to bring a wide range of issues to the attention of a committee in accordance with the Council's Constitution. All of these issues must be considered for their equalities and diversity implications.

4.9.1 The Committee may wish to utilise the CIL funding priorities agreed by the Area Committee as a guide towards determining an application. Officers will work on collating key information to assist Members in reviewing priorities including infrastructure needs by area and insight data.

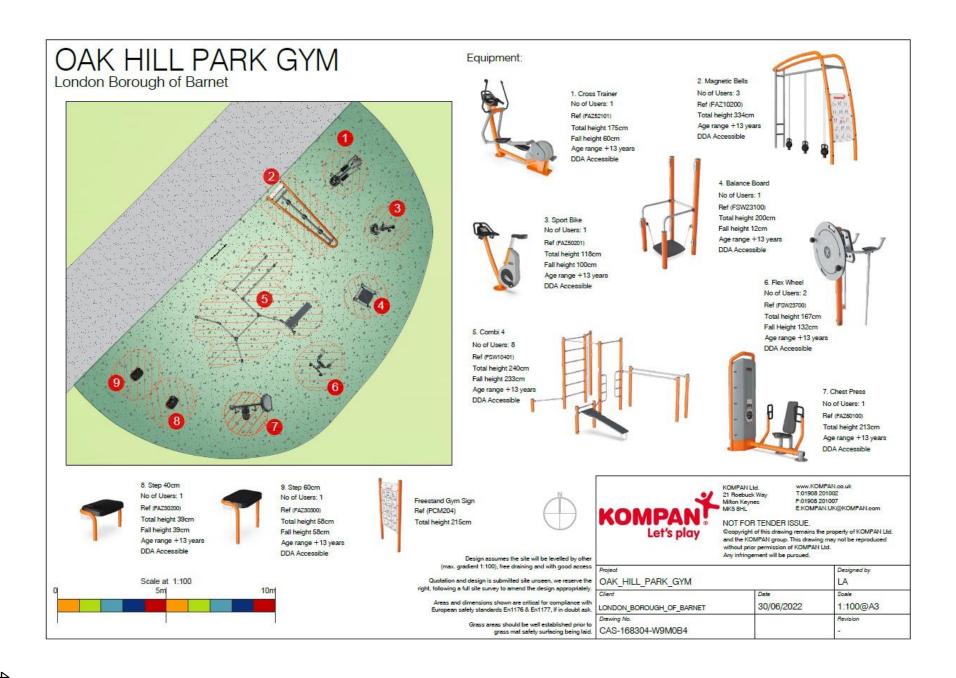

Historically it was part of the Copped Hall Estate, which was originally open countryside, but was developed into farmland and parts were landscaped into Parkland. The Manning family purchased the land in 1780 and planted large numbers of oak trees and created a circular spinney designed to mark the Jubilee of George III. The Mannings employed the famous landscape designer Repton to construct the ornamental boating and fishing lake, that is now known as the Darlands Lake. This lake was formed by damming the Folly Brook, a stream that runs west to east between the valley and then flows into the Dollis Brook and River Brent. It is this circular walk around the lake that we are seeking to restore. The original Copped Hall was demolished in 1929 and rebuilt as the "Darlands". The last owner Mr Kemp died during the Second World War and the Council at the time bought a large part of the Manor farmland to prevent further residential development of the area. This passed to the London Borough of Barnet in 1965. The Darlands Nature Reserve was then leased to and managed by the Herts and Middlesex Wildlife

Trust from 1971 to 1999. During this period the reserve was managed by a site warden and local volunteers. However, the lake and surrounding area was not maintained adequately, and Barnet Council again took over its management. Sadly, the whole area has been neglected and the Darlands Conservation Trust (a charitable CIO) was established in 2019 with a 99-year lease to care for and restore this beautiful and unique 80 acres of Green Belt.

The Darlands Conservation Trust is made up of individuals that represent the different surrounding communities, together with Cllr. Val Duschinsky (Mill Hill Ward) and Cllr. Caroline Stock (Totteridge and Woodside Ward). Since the trust has been formed a management plan has been written for the reserve, which has had a number of costly ecological surveys incorporated into it. Unfortunately, when the reserve was handed over two barns were left in a very dilapidated condition and the Trust had to raise £35,000 to remove the asbestos, due to safety concerns. A large volunteer group has been working on the reserve (including members of Goodgym), clearing for example, the ditches, restoring scrub and removing invasive species from the Alder Carr (a very unusual habitat in this part of England). We are trying to engage with different groups around the Borough on workdays e.g. Mitzvah Day. The reserve is made up of a diverse mosaic of important habitats including an Ancient Woodland (and more than thirty 350-yearold Veteran trees), Wetland (lake, streams, brooks, ditches, and the Alder Carr), Grassland and Parkland. This forms an important blue-green corridor connecting Greater London with Hertfordshire.

The Trust has fully engaged with surrounding local

communities, holding a large Queen's Platinum Jubilee Fayre on Totteridge Green that was attended by thousands of residents who expressed their support for Darlands. A further fund-raising dinner was subsequently held as there is so much that needs to be restored including dredging the lake (cost £450,000) that now has become badly silted up.

Why are we asking the committee for this grant?

During the Covid lockdown many thousands of new residents discovered the Darlands for the first time, astonished to find this amazing green oasis literally on their doorsteps. In order to encourage these and other new residents to come and experience and explore, we have a duty to make it a safe and welcoming space without detracting from its natural beauty.

The Darlands footpaths have now become eroded and dangerous with parts of the paths being so deep with mud that they are impassable during the winter. A further issue is that "desire lines" are being created eroding the surrounding vegetation beside the paths which are sites for many special flowers that are being destroyed, such as the rare Snakehead Fritillaries.

Therefore, we have discussed with Greenspaces and their contractors the best ways of making the pathways through the nature reserve as safe and accessible for everyone as we possibly can. This will involve putting down a new firm base and top. Caroline Stock met up with Rob Wiltshire and the contractor who is preparing quotes for this restoration which we plan to be split between the two wards, Totteridge and Mill Hill.

Wider Community Benefit

The Darlands and its surrounding walks have been incorporated into the Healthy Walks that Barnet Public Health have recently produced and promoted. This links the reserve with the Dollis Valley Walk. This fact together with Covid has increased visitor numbers enormously and residents are coming from all over the Borough and beyond to enjoy the incredible views and walks. Lots of local schools and organisations such as the local Scouts, Guides and Cadets have come to the reserve as part of various projects. There are large number of bird watchers (who have recently spotted a Peregrine Falcon and a new Rookery) and other groups such as a painting group and Asian Diabetic walking group who now use the area to promote good mental and physical wellbeing. We have set up the "Darlanders" which is a supporter's group that the trustees hope will encourage community cohesion of

the area. We are also engaging with Middlesex University who have the environment, sustainability and ecology at the core of their strategic plan and who want to be involved with the future of Darlands. The site is accessed from numerous points around the Totteridge, Mill Hill and Woodside Park area through a series of footpaths (statutory and permissive), all of which are on good local transport routes. The increase in footfall has also happened because of the new developments at Millbrook Park with up to 8,000 new residents, the large Ridgeway View development on Mill Hill Ridgeway and the new developments in Whetstone, which all have easy access into the reserve. The Darlands Nature Reserve is a gem in the heart of the Borough. However, safe access for residents is essential. The lake and surrounding woodland is currently within a SINC and we envisage the entire area eventually becoming a public open space reclassified as a SINC. By increasing the size of the nature reserve and improving access we are taking many households out of areas of deficiency to public open space. This meets targets for both Barnet and the London Local Plan. The Trustees did a random survey interviewing people walking through the Darlands during Covid. The majority of people were regular walkers and came to the reserve because they felt that it added to both their physical and mental health. This fits in with the new Barnet Health and Well Being Strategy as well as the new Barnet Local Plan. The vision and plan

What we are hoping to achieve

About us

St John's URC community garden is co-ordinated by two groups: St John's United Reformed Church (New Barnet) and Incredible Edible Barnet.

The community at St John's URC are forward thinking in their environmental outlook and as a result the church won a silver award from the A Rocha Eco Church scheme in 2019. A Rocha's mission is to equip churches to express their care for God's world in their worship and teaching; in how they look after their buildings and land; in how they engage with their local community and in global campaigns, and in the personal lifestyles of their congregation.

The silver award was based on the church's Green Christian network (where it hosts regular meetings on a range of 'green' topics with churches from the local area), its installation of solar panels and its community garden. It is hoped the advancement of the outside space will help towards a gold award in the future.

Heather, a member of the church and a community garden co-ordinator, has been working in horticulture, maintaining, designing and planting gardens for 19 years. She studied for the Royal Horticultural Society general certificate in Horticulture and Garden Design at Capel Manor College, and she gardens with biodiversity at the forefront of her practice.

One of the other co-ordinators is Wendy from Incredible Edible Barnet. She set up the project in 2016 with the aim of increasing the amount of food grown in public places for the community to share. The garden also aims to raise awareness of the environmental, nutritional and health benefits of home growing and is run organically with nature and the planet in mind so we can also support our local wildlife.

Wendy is a member of several local environment networks, including Barnet Together's VCFSE Environmental Network, the Barnet Green Spaces Network and Barnet Friends of the Earth. She holds an Extended Certificate in Horticulture and a Permaculture Design Certificate.

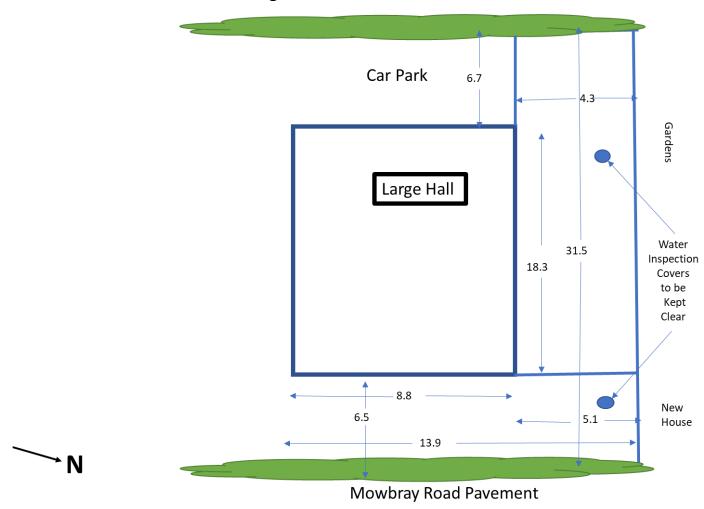
We hope the below emphasises how the church views the expansion of the garden as part of its mission to provide a focus of peace to the local community:

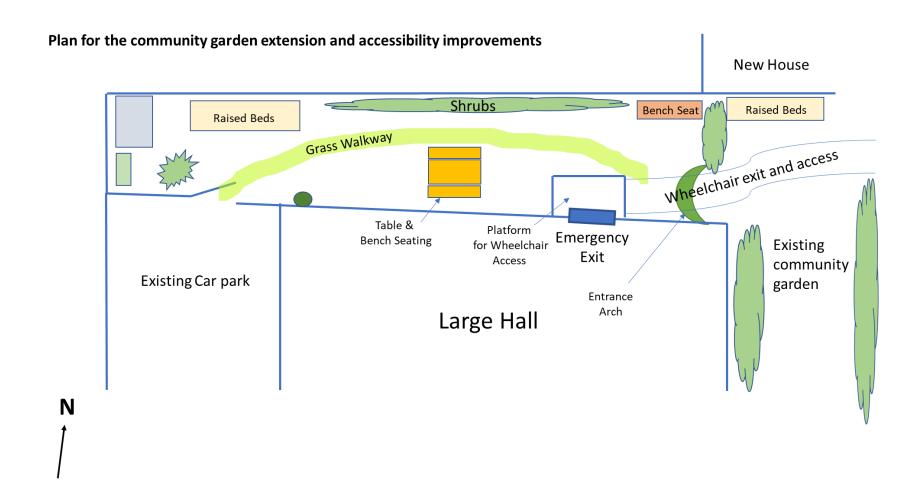
