Field Mead has limited pavements, which increases the risk of speeding cal hitting pedestrians. We, the undersigned, petition the London Borough of Barnet to install	
traffic calming measures on Heybourne Crescent, which should include (but not be limited to):	е
 Clear signage advising of a 20mph limit and warning motorists of children playing in the vicinity Speed bumps along the entirety of the Crescent Regular policing of cars, with action taken against those exceeding the 20mph limit and those parked illegally, which limits visibility and makes crossing dangerous. Installation of a bollard/ barrier to prevent Heybourne Crescent and Field Mead being used as a rat run between Lanacre Avenue and Grahame Park Way. We also ask that as the new phases of the Grahame Park regeneration commence, developers should keep pedestrian safety at the forefront of their minds as they design the extension to Heybourne Crescent and new roads, such as the proposed Bristol Road to replace Quaker's Course.

The resulting disturbances to the nearby neighbours, including very early in the morning and at weekends, is simply unacceptable.	
	We believe the business would be better placed on an industrial site more suited to the all day collections and deliveries by numerous vans and articulated lorries. 
